

Jury Methods Attacked
By Indicted Persons

The grand jury has suddenly been called into session, for the purpose, it is intimated, of re-indicting persons charged with crimes and misdemeanors by the last two grand juries.

Pleas in abatement were this week filed by fifteen or twenty defendants who had been indicted by the two grand juries, alleging that certain members had been improperly selected.

Instead of filling vacancies on juries by drawing names from the jury box, the system has been for Sheriff Hoffman to make the selection from "bystanders."

The Post-Democrat believes that there should be a searching investigation here as to the methods used in impaneling juries, both grand and petit.

The editor of this newspaper is now under conviction for contempt of court for charging irregularities in the local jury system, and in a second conviction for criminal libel a lengthy plea in abatement was filed setting forth and charging that the appointment of one of the jury commissioners was not according to law, that the names were not properly put in the box and that the drawing of the names was not done legally.

Aside from the law points involved it does not stand to reason that men like John Hampton and Harry Hoffman should have it within their power to control the personnel of juries.

Recently a big will case was scheduled for trial in the circuit court and a special venire of eighteen prospective jurors was ordered to be drawn from the jury box.

When the names were made public it was found that the wife of the principal defendant, a banker, was

included in the list, together with the names of three others closely connected with the banker, in a business way.

The attorneys for the plaintiff looked over the list of veniremen and promptly moved for a change of venue out of the county, for the sole and only reason that the thing looked raw, on its face.

When the editor of the Post-Democrat went on trial for "libeling" a klanman before Judge Victor Simmons of the Blackford circuit court and "klokard" of the Hartford City Ku Klux Klan, Sheriff Hoffman and Jury Commissioner John Hampton were busy on the job.

The first man brought in by the sheriff to fill a vacancy, after a successful challenge, was Sam Parkinson, who admitted under close questioning that he belonged to the Ku Klux Klan.

The "pick-ups" brought in by Hoffman were mostly hangers on at the Banner cigar store, a klux gambling joint on the south side of the square. One of the jurors who was brought in was a fellow named Charles Lewellen, a klanman with a record extending across the country from Wyoming to Muncie.

Before taking his seat in the jury box this fellow was seen in the rear room of the sheriff's office, in close conversation with Jury Commissioner John Hampton.

Another later case was that of a klanman from Daleville, charged with a violation of the liquor law, acquitted by a klan jury "picked up" by Sheriff Hoffman. On that occasion klanmen worked openly assisting the sheriff in getting the "right" people on the jury, it is declared.

Cheap Trick

In September, 1923, the kluxers started a "democratic" newspaper for the purpose of taking legal advertising away from the Post-Democrat. It struggled along for a year and died a miserable death.

On January 2 a new publication appeared, calling itself the Muncie Democrat. We investigated and found that it was run by a fellow named Frank Parrott, who runs the Eaton Enterprise, a republican newspaper.

Parrott is a member of Bemender's new tangled klan and is republican committeeman in Precinct 24.

The application for entry in the mails of this "democratic" sheet was in the name of Eva Parrott, who made affidavit in the application that she was the sole owner.

Eva Parrott is the wife of Frank Parrott and is secretary of the company owning the Eaton republican newspaper. She served as a republican on the Eaton election board in November.

The names of neither of the Parrotts appear in the editorial head of the "Muncie Democrat," which, by the way, declares itself to be the "official" democratic publication of the county.

The name of one Ervin Black appears as "editor." Investigation discloses that Black is a common laborer at the Warner Corporation, working in a department supervised by Frank Sample, husband of Nina Sample.

Black is polled in his precinct as a republican and has always been known as republican. He has no more to do with the fake democratic newspaper than Cal Coolidge. The promoters of the sheet fine tooth

combed Delaware county trying to find some democrat who would allow his name to appear on the fake sheet, and without success, so the Samples compelled poor Ervin Black to be the goat.

Last election day, by the way, Ervin Black drove an automobile decorated with Coolidge banners and he wore a republican badge and worked all day at the polls in the fifteenth precinct.

The paper has absolutely no paid circulation, yet Postmaster Billy Williams, knowing the fraudulent claims of the publishers and the utter falsity and crookedness of the entire project, sent in his official certification as to the truth of every statement made by the applicant.

The purpose of this freak publication is to take away from the Post-Democrat, if possible, legal notices which are required by law to be published by township trustees in the month of January and February, in two newspapers representing the two leading political parties, amounting probably, in their entirety, to a thousand dollars.

But the promoters, apparently, overlooked one important thing. And that is that the Post-Democrat is not in the habit of taking a licking lying down.

The trustees themselves know that no court on earth would ever be a party to such an apparent design to defeat the intent of the legislature which enacted the law requiring trustees' reports to be published in two newspapers of OPPOSITE politics.

They know that the Post-Democrat is the only democratic newspaper in Delaware county and that the

publication of their reports in a publication born of such antecedents and spawned in such a hatchery as this so called "Muncie Democrat" would be utterly illegal.

The Post-Democrat will publish all twelve reports and if necessary will go into court, as we did recently at Newcastle, to prove the legality of our claims and to prove further that this Muncie Democrat is not a democratic newspaper at all. The trustee or other public official who runs legal advertising in that counterfeit publication will merely run the risk of being compelled by the state board of accounts to refund the money out of his own pocket.

Said Judge BlackBowers Justified In
Shooting Davidson

Kluxer Was Found In Company of Bowers' Wife and Injured Husband Shot Him Up Somewhat.

Newark, O., Jan. 30.—"The prisoner is dismissed. Any man who persists in going with a married woman after being warned is entitled to no protection under the law. That is the substance of Judge Black's decision in the case of Ernest Bowers, who was charged with shooting to kill Waldo Davidson.

Davidson had been running around with Mrs. Bowers, despite repeated warnings to cease his attentions, and on January 22 of last year, Bowers caught the pair together and sent a bullet into Davidson's arm, which was so badly shattered it had to be amputated.

Bowers left town before he could be arrested and the kluxer administration has been devoting a large part of its time to a search for him. He was finally located in Youngstown and returned to Newark for trial on a charge of shooting to kill.

Unfortunately for the kluxers, Judge Collins had gone to Florida, leaving Judge Black in charge of the municipal court. Probably the decision would have been different had Judge Collier been on the bench, but Judge Black evidently does not believe that membership in an organization formed to "protect pure womanhood" gives a man license to break up the home of one who is not a member.

Redkey, Judge

Saturday afternoon a squad of police went as uninvited guests to one of Bob Graves's pink teas, in his more or less celebrated "soft drink parlor," as it is tenderly designated by our local dailies.

One of the cops opened Bob's safe and found a gallon jug full of white mule. As the next step he was arraigned in the court of Judge Harry Redkey, where he promptly plead not guilty.

Redkey, it will be recalled, served once as Bob's good angel, by sitting as special judge and acquitting him, taking Bob's word against the evidence of several policemen and other ers.

Later Bob got mixed up in a shooting scrape. A man was killed but Bob was indicted merely for shooting with intent to kill, the jury probably being of the opinion that the murdered man was guilty of contributory negligence in getting in the way of a flying bullet.

Redkey had performed in a way worth while before, so both hired him for the defense, and this case, after

a long delay, is undergoing its preliminaries in the circuit court, in the way of pleas in abatement, etc.

With Redkey, as attorney for the defense, it would hardly be proper for Redkey to appear as his judge in the liquor case, so he will no doubt be tried before another special judge.

The Post-Democrat recently in commenting on the appointment of Redkey to succeed the late Judge Coons, declared that it was an improper appointment and in making that statement he had in mind his ridiculous and utterly uncalled for acquittal of Bob Graves some months ago, when the evidence of the man's guilt was as clear as the noonday sun.

Notwithstanding the undisputed evidence that Bob has been running a blind tiger and crap shootery for over three years, the police have never been able to convict him. He always escapes by the special judge route. He is Muncie's chief offender and the appointment of his attorney as city judge, was decidedly in poor taste.
