

Hence the will and wishes of a few, may, and ought to be, sacrificed to the public good. A man's own good is to be regarded, rather than his unreasonable and mad wishes. Some people neither fear God, nor regard man; and others are the own worst enemies, and need guardians all their lives. Liberty to such men, that is freedom from restraint, is simple ruin—it amounts in their case, to suicide.

I may be told that I am entertaining my audience with truisms, denied by no one. Very well—these truisms, universally admitted, involve all that I ask for, in endeavoring to determine the relation of government, to the cause of temperance.

If they are admitted already, I only have the less to do. And they are admitted, not only theoretically but practically, in the administration of public authority and law. And on this fact I take my stand to-day. In very many things, the public safety, the public good, are made to outweigh individual rights and liberties. Restraint is put upon the individual, and the lesser interests are set aside for the sake of the greater, and more general good. I only urge that this principle of public policy so extensively applied in our municipal government, should be carried a little farther, and applied in the all important and urgent case of Intemperance. I ask, in this, for nothing new—only for the enforcement of a principle which is of daily application already. I will mention a few [To be Continued.]

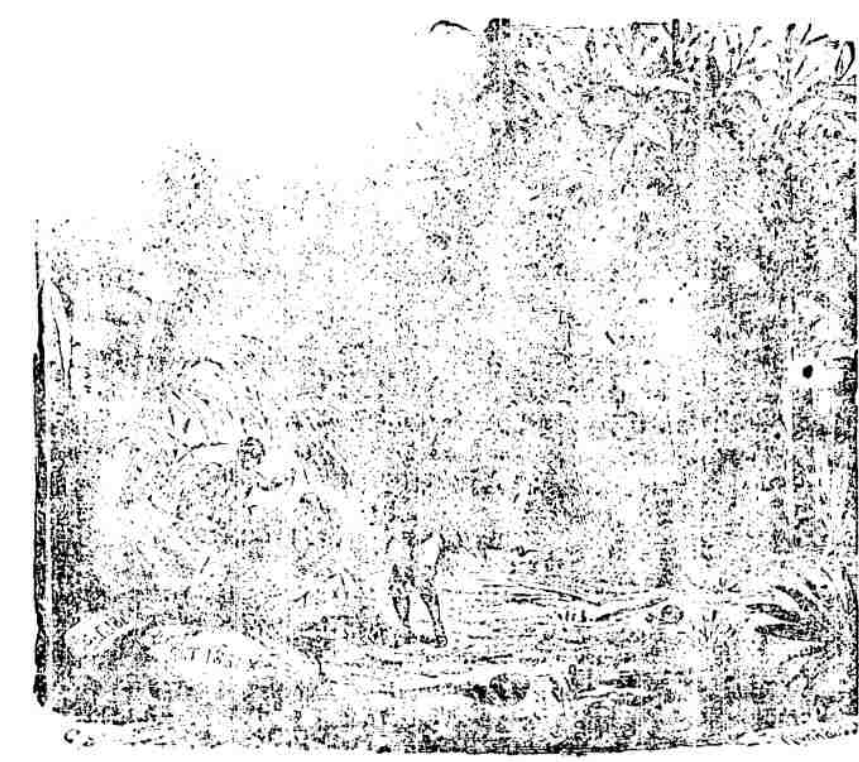

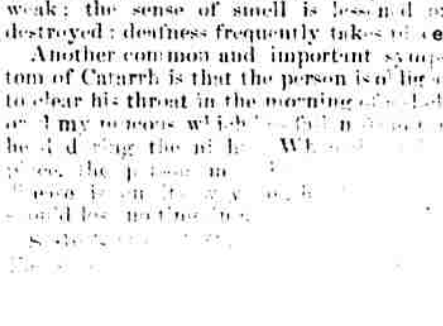

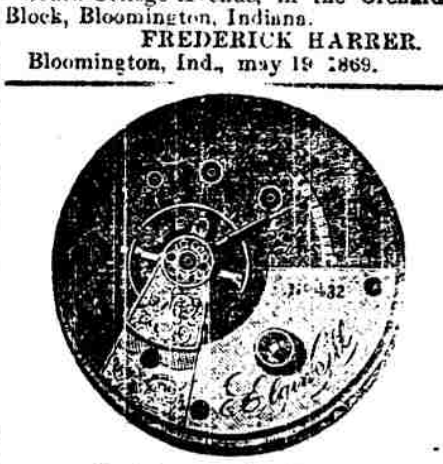
