**REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.**

A delegate State Convention of the Republican party of Indiana will be held in the city of Indianapolis on Thursday, the 22d of February, 1872, at 10 o'clock A.M. for the nomination of candidates for the State offices and one Congressman for the State at large, (if provided for by act of Congress,) for designating candidates for Presidential electors, for appointing delegates to the National Republican Convention, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the Convention.

The order of nomination is indicated as follows: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of State, Treasurer of State, Clerk of the Supreme Court, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Attorney General and Congressman at large.

Upon the basis adopted by the Committee, the representation is fixed at one delegate for each one hundred votes, and one delegate for each fraction over fifty votes cast in the several counties in the State for Hon. M. F. Hoffman, for Secretary of State [at the general election of 1872].

Ren. is too shrewd to take hucks when corn is just as easily gotten.

—Every train, last week, was well filled with students, returning to the University, after a Holiday vacation.—First the Bedford Temperance Wreath died, and now the Bedford News announces in last week's number that no more papers will be issued. The newspaper business is "mighty onerous," at best—not one country paper in ten stands upon a solid, paying, or "paid for" basis.—A number of the dignitaries of the L. N. A. & C. Railroad passed over the line in a special car, on Friday last.

The Democratic Central Committee of Lawrence County have given the name of the State Convention, for the purpose of selecting Delegates to the State Convention, and also to elect and organize a County Central Committee, to act during the campaign of 1872. So far as we are advised at present, Monroe County has no local

axis to grind upon the political wheel that is to revolve at Indianapolis on the 22d of February, and no suggestion is therefore necessary as to the Delegate matter.

But in the selection of a County Central Committee, there should be much discretion exercised. A dead Central Committee never yet infused life into a campaign: endeavor to select live, active men—men who will feel that the success of the party is their individual interest, and all will be well.

We are glad to note the fact that as yet the Republican Party of Monroe county has no noisy, hungry aspirants for petty offices. This is a healthful indication, and if our people will continue to act with harmony, and unite upon a sound, unobjectionable ticket, Monroe county will again poll a full Republican vote.
