THE EAST.

The employees of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas road, which runs through Indian Territory, are greatly alarmed over the frequency of attempts to wreck trains and murder engineers and brakemen. An extra force of police has been sent up, and white cut-throats murdered two of them.

THE APACHES are at their old work of murder and rapine in the neighborhood of Sonora, N. M. The State troops and citizens of the town are chasing the red-skins, who believe 400 to number 200, under the leadership of Naiche.

GEX. CARE, the gallant officer who was reported to have been massacred with his entire command by Indians at Fort Apache last summer, but who, I every and Shuly found a way out of the perils situation and averted a massacre, is under arrest at Fort Grant, by order of Gen. W. W. Belknap, the Adjutant General of Armies, for trial by court-martial... Two freight trains on the Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad collided on the bridge at La Crosse, breaking up, with an explosion, the bridge, and killing the engineer.

The damage to the bridge is estimated at \$50,000... The wholesale grocery firm of Sibley, Dudley & Co., of Chicago, has made an arrangement for the payment of credit to the Indians, who are to be paid 75 per cent of them... Bishop Gilmore, of the Catholic diocese of Cleveland, who has heretofore opposed the League, has decided to make a public symposium with the movement, with the exception of the one on rent.

ADVICES are received by way of *Postumus*, Arizona, of an Indian battle near Yanqui river, in Mexico. A body of Mexican troops were pursuing a band of Apaches, by whom they were ambushed. After a desperate struggle to dislodge the Indians, the troops were compelled to retreat. They lost five killed and several wounded... The Illinois Supreme Court, in a case against the Board of Education of Quincy, has ruled that colored children have the right to attend the public schools and receive the benefit of the school fund the same as white children... A serious accident occurred on the Dubuque division of the Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, near Lansing, Iowa, caused by the breaking of a wheel. The smoking and ladies cars were precipitated down an embankment, and the occupants were all alive and no injuries were sustained. One citizen, however, and it is feared several of the injured will die.
