Deposit your ballot at an early

—Good neighborhood workers are more valuable to any party than average long-winded speech makers, they tell.

—REPUBLICANS should understand the situation. They can only succeed by great efforts and great vigilance, maintained up to the very closing of the polls on election day. Our opponents are desperate and unscrupulous, and will stop at nothing to achieve success. If Republicans wish to avert the calamity of a Democratic victory they must work harder than they ever worked before, and must not relax their efforts till the last vote is in, nor their watchfulness till the last vote is counted. Money, fraud and the circulation of stories without foundation, are what we have to fear.

—We can beat them with legitimate weapons, but to this end there must be brave, incessant and unflagging effort.

—THERE is a hint of what the Democratic policy will be in river counties of Indiana. On election day Kentucky is expected to do her duty.
