Something about the Men Who
Represent the Hoosier
State in Congress.

Biographical Facts and Figures Gleaned from
that Wonderful Mine of Information
But Peirce Poor's Congress
Simplifies Directly.

THE SENATORS.

Daniel W. Voorhees, of Terre Haute, was
born in Butler County, Ohio, Sept. 29, 1817;
graduated at Miami University in 1849; studied law and commenced his practice
at Marion, Ind., in 1852; was State At-
torney of Indiana in 1858, and was elected
to the Forty-third Congress, and was re-
elected to the Forty-fourth Congress, and
was again elected to the Forty-fifth Congress.

John H. Bowen, of Indianapolis, was
elected to the Forty-fifth Congress, and
was reelected to the Forty-sixth Congress.

Benjamin Harrison, of Indianapolis, was
born near North Bend, Harrison County, Ohio,
Aug. 29, 1833; studied law and was admitted
to the bar in 1854; was a member of the
House of Representatives in 1863; was a
Democrat in 1864; in a district having a
large adverse majority, as a candidate for Congress
and defeated only by a close vote. In 1867 was
elected to the Forty-ninth Congress, and was
re-elected to the Fifty-first Congress.
