State Central Committee.

The State Central Committee of

the Republican party met at the

New-Deinson hotel in Indianapolis

on Thursday evening last.

Senator J. N. Huston, of Con-

nersville, was unanimously elected

chairman. D. N. Ransdell, of In-

dianapolis, was elected vice chairman,

L. L. Michener, of Shelbyville, sec-

retary, all by unanimous votes.

The election of a treasurer and of

the executive and finance commit-

tees was postponed till the next

meeting of the committee.

On motion of W. F. Browning,

of Bloomington, the following was

adopted:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of

this committee, and we believe it to be

that of the party in Indiana, that no

appointment to a vacancy made by the

removal of incumbent on charges should

be confirmed until those charges have

been presented to the Senate and in-

vestigated. Also, that in cases where

charges have been made against ap-

pointees, they should not be confirmed

until the charges have been thor-

oughly investigated, to the end

that the public service may not be

debated by the appointment of bad or

incapable men.

No time was fixed for holding the

next State convention. There was

some informal talk about the time,

but no definite action. The general

sentiment was in favor of a late con-

vention, probably not earlier than

July or August. The basis of rep-

resentation in the convention was

fixed at one delegate for each 200

votes cast for Blaine and one dele-

gate for each fraction of 100 in ex-

cess.

There was a general discussion

of the prospects of the party in the

coming campaign. It was felt that

the dissensions in the Democratic

rank and the dissatisfaction with

President Cleveland's policy made

Republican success extremely prob-

able. Each member of the com-

mittee reported the outlook in his

section of the State as encouraging.
