HON. BEN HARRISON.

The Indiana Senator's Vigorous Argument of the Party of Pretenses.

A Speech Delivered Before the Republican State Convention of Indiana.

Gentlemen of the Republican State Convention, and Fellow-citizens:

I sincerely thank you for this last expression of your confidence and good-will. I have not before received expressions of your confidence and kindness. I cannot make you any promises, but I have the right to have any undersigned to give him to you—no one respects and confidence, and my hearty sympathy to the party you represent. I have never known any other political alliance than that of the Republican party. I was born into my political manhood with its birth. I have followed its triumphs with enthusiasm; I have given to it its success; all the powers with which it has been endowed. I have not before heard my witness that I have not asked to be put on parade by my party. If there has ever been a man who has not asked to be put on parade by his party, it is that man.

In the seats in which you are sitting—a convention representing the Democratic party, I might say, I have looked upon both conventions, that this one, a somewhat more respectable, equally intelligent and equally entitled to the exercise of the full rights of citizenship. I have a habit of not doing what I have done.

In Kansas the lowest average reported is 21 per cent, and the highest 100. The average for the State ranges from 66 to 72 per cent. In Missouri the average for the fifteen counties that are most affected is 55 per cent.
