Preparing for Cholera.

At a meeting of the state board of health yesterday afternoon the sanitary condition of the county poor asylums was discussed. This was called up at this time by the apprehension that cholera may enter the United States from Mexico this summer. From the reports of the county asylum superintendents, it is found that at least 25 percent of the buildings are in a wretched condition, and that not the commonest appliances for the preservation of health are supplied. In many places the male and female inmates are not separated as they should be, and arrangements for cleanliness and decency are remarkably insufficient. It is proposed that the board of health visit each county and make thorough investigations of the needs of the paupers, and also examine the organization of health boards in the various county seats. The trip of inspection will be taken as soon as all the county reports are at hand.

It would be well to investigate some of the backyards and premises generally, in Bloomington, while this committee is at work. If people in certain portions do not have cholera or at least cholera symptoms this summer, it won't be for a lack of inducements in the way of fit.
