It may be of interest to those who indulge in gambling to know that the supreme court of Indiana has decided that under the law providing for the recovery of monies lost at the gambler's table the proprietor of the house is responsible, even though the betting is carried on in his absence. The wife or children of one who has lost on gambling schemes may sue and recover money. The court also says that those who are employed in the gambling trade, instead of standing in relation of principal and agent, simply become confederates in crime, and each is as much liable for the acts of the other as if he had performed the whole himself.

DePew and Harrison would make a strong combination. The former would be potent enough to carry New York, and the latter could undoubtedly make Indiana a safe Republican State, at least for this year.—*St. Louis Globe.*

Signs of Republican Victory.

Cleveland Leader: The Republicans have majorities on joint ballot in the legislatures of Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Wisconsin. These States have 219 electoral votes, enough to elect the Republican Presidential candidates and eighteen votes to spare. The Republicans elected a majority of the Representatives in Congress in 1866 in California, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, and Wisconsin, and one-half the members in New Hampshire. These States, leaving out New Hampshire, have 243 electoral votes—enough to elect the Republican Presidential candidates and 42 votes to spare.

The spring elections all over the country this year show that the gains of 1866 and 1867 in Congressmen and members of the State Legislatures were accurate indications of a political revolution that is destined to reverse this fall the verdict of 1864. The Republicans are sweeping to victory in November.

One of the new democratic chiefs of division in the pension office, hailing from Indiana, has posted the following notice in a conspicuous place in his office: "Hereafter I don't want any of my hands to walk about the corduroys during office hours."

HARRISON AND HAWLEY,

If nominated for President and Vice President at Chicago, they can and will be.

It requires 261 electoral votes to elect a President, that being a majority of the electoral college. Cleveland in 1864, receives 219 electoral votes, and Blaine 182.

Without counting the States of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, and Indiana, the Republicans have 219 electoral votes in the Solid South, 153. Indiana has 14 electoral votes and Connecticut 6, making 20 votes, which added to Mr. Blaine's vote of 182 foot up 303, a clear majority.

It is an indisputable fact that General Ben Harrison can carry Indiana and General Blaine Indiana and the Solid South.

Therefore if the Republican party is anxious to elect a President in 1868, let them nominate these two gallant soldiers, and the election is a foregone conclusion. If Cleveland should carry New York and New Jersey and the Solid South, then he will have 303, and General Harrison and General Hawley cannot only carry Indiana and Connecticut, but can also carry New York and New Jersey as well.

This ticket would be absolutely invincible, and if nominated at Chicago and placed on an adjusted political platform, the party would go sweeping out to victory in November, 1868. Hip! Hip! Hurrah for Harrison and Hawley.
