MUST THE COLORED MINISTERS GO?

The South Carolina Sec. of the Protestant Episcopal Church Discusses a Very Important Question.

The Baltimore Sun's special from Charleston, S. C., says: "The report of the committee appointed by the South Carolina diocesan convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, to try and settle the color question, recommends a compromise which proposes to admit colored clergymen to the convention, but to exclude them from the church for a year prior to May 18, 1889, when the convention meets at Anderson. It also proposes a separate congregation for the colored churches in the diocesan convention of the bishops. No provision is made for the admission of colored lay-delегates. A prominent vestryman of St. Marks, the aristocratic colored church here, that the terms would not be accepted. We were told that the colored clergymen said, 'we shall simply wait and let it out of the diocesan convention, we shall carry the case to the general convention.' As to whether St. Marks would consent to pay its contribution to the colored clergymen, he was not prepared to say. The question promised to be a burning one at the coming convention.

Army Officers Arrested.

Army officers who are not so lucky as to have had staff appointments have taken alarm at the action of Major General Slocum in appointing his brother as a side-de-camp on his staff. It was Secretary Endicott's policy to distribute these places, which he regarded as educational, among officers who had previously been employed in connection with their regiments. When Sir Slocum was made an officer, he said, he had that they had acquired all of the benefits likely to be received from the places, and that they should give way to other officers. Secretary Endicott's position on this matter gave rise to a great stir, and the place was high in rank, but was generally well received by the line. In the present instance the side-de-camp has already served a number of years in that capacity, and a few days ago Sir Slocum will establish a precedent which will be seized upon by other Major-Generals as an excuse for overturning the practice established by Secretary Endicott.

Schooner Sunk.

Norfolk (Va.) special: The old Dominion steamer Wyandot, from New York, arrived here five hours late, after having been in collision with Delaware Capes with the schooner Ruth Darling. At the time of the collision a dense fog prevailed, which was so thick that the two vessels could not see ahead more than half the vessel's length. When the Wyandot struck the schooner, her sharp bows cut clear through and the schooner ten minutes afterward. The Wyandot struck the schooner again. A sailor on the Wyandot jumped from the rigging and caught her anchor chain and thus saved himself. Capt. Lowell, who was at the schooner's wheel at the time of the disaster, and another sailor, Harrison, were lost. Another sailor, Frank, and another seaman were saved by means of ropes thrown from the steamer.

They Like Me.

London special: A dispatch announces that Mr. Harrison has nominated Robert E. Lee as minister to England—was dined at a dinner given by Earl Cowper, scion of Cranborne, where a son of Lord Salisbury was a guest, and upon arriving the news, he immediately hurried to Arlington street and he parted in silence to his father. The new Minister, and the son, who was a pleasant surprise.

Chicago special: Hon. Robert T. Lincoln is in receipt of telegrams from all parts of the country congratulating him. He can not yet decide up to his mind as to whether he will accept or not. Brought Down the Steamer.

At Blocton, Ala., John Warren, disguised as a negro, opened the Southern express office with pistol in hand and ordered Agent M. H. Huey, Jr., to surrender. Huey didn't, but when a bullet, one ball striking Huey on the breast and glancing, breaking one in, Huey seized his own pistol and fired three shots at the robber, who was shot dead. About a hundred feet from the office door, one of Huey's is hit him in the breast, and he died.

Handed Over to a Band of Indians.

Marked man at Alton, Ill., took three of the accused cut-throat thieves, Gannow, Babcock, and Remus, from their homes across the line into the reservation and delivered them to a band of Indians. It is believed that all three were killed. They had been released by the vigilance committee some time ago on their promise to leave, but they failed to keep the promise.

Loses by Fire.

A fire broke out in the St. Paul Hotel and Provision Company's establishment at St. Paul, Minn., and burned fiercely for an hour. Loss, \$60,000; insurance, \$30,000.

An incendiary is occurred in the yard of the Reading Lumber Company at Reading, Pa., and \$30,000 worth of lumber was destroyed. There have been four previous attempts to burn the company's property, and the total loss to the owners is \$40,000.

Funeral of Justice Mathews.

Funeral service over the remains of the late Associate Justice Mathews was held in Washington, D. C., on the 26th ult. A number of prominent persons were present, including President Harrison and all the members of his cabinet. Vice President Morton, the Justices of the Supreme Court, many Senators and other distinguished persons. The remains were taken to Glenwood, Ohio, for interment.
