**ORDINANCE NO. 56.**

An ordinance to prevent throwing any substance at, into or against the Band Stand, situated in the court house yard of the city of Bloomington, Indiana, for the purpose of preventing looting, loitering, playing, running, skating, dancing, or any way disorderly conduct.

Section I. No ordinance of like kind or character exists in the city of Bloomington, in the State of Indiana, that it shall be unlawful for any person to throw any substance, at, into or against the Band Stand, situated in the Court House yard of the City of Bloomington, Indiana, to be found in, or near, the Band Stand.

Section II. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay to said City any sum exceeding twenty-five dollars, without a trial.

Section III. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its legal publication.
