That Mr. Craven made a good secretary no one will deny. But did he fail to charge his regular per diem during all that time? An examination of the records will show, as they are public property.

This day in each year is set apart as a public holiday, when all men of every party, are called upon to pay their respects to the dead heroes of the late war.

All men who love the soldiers, their widows and their orphans, grieve with joy each recurrence of Decoration Day, and gladly lay aside their work for one day in order that they may pay their tribute to the fond memories of the Nation's dead.

We would at least expect that one who holds a high office in our county and who feeds from the public crib—one who draws his \$4 per day regularly from the county treasury, a part of which is paid there from the hard earnings of disabled and crippled soldiers and who sets himself up as a model and example to the youth of our county, would, out of mere respect for the dead if not for love of them, lay down his pen and close his office door on that holy day and join in that long procession of aid soldiers, the widows and orphans, which each year finds its way to the graves of the heroic dead.

It seems that he might for one day at least gather a rose and drop it on the grave of some dead hero who helped to make it possible for him to hold such a lucrative position in a Government like ours. Will the editor vote for a man who pursues his usual avocation on this sacred day and charges the county \$4 for it?

AN ORDINANCE
for the improvement of Lincoln street and the cost thereof.

Sec. I. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Bloomington, Indiana, two-thirds of all members thereof concurring therein, that Lincoln street in said city be improved by Grading, Guttering, Macadamizing and paving a brick sidewalk on both sides thereof from Third street to 10th street, in accordance with the plan and specifications hereinafter adopted by the Common Council for the improvement of said street, now in the office of the Clerk of said City, and in accordance with the resolution of the Common Council adopted August 19th, 1890.

Sec. II. The cost of said improvement of said street, except the proportion thereof of occupied by street and alley crossings, shall be assessed per linear front foot against the real estate abutting thereon, and assessment, if defered, shall be paid in ten annual installments to each of which shall be added interest at six per cent, payable semi-annually from the date of final estimate herein, and collected as provided by law.

A bond or bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said deferred assessments, unless the property owners pay their assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in the act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8th, 1881.

for the improvement of Kirkwood Avenue and the cost thereof.

Sec. I. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the city of Bloomington, Indiana, two-thirds of the members thereof concurring therein, that Kirkwood Avenue is said city be improved by paving a brick sidewalk on the north side thereof from College Avenue to Jackson street, according to plan and specifications hereinafter adopted by the Common Council for the improvement of said street, now in the office of the City Clerk, and in accordance with the resolution of the Common Council adopted August 19th, 1890.

Sec. II. The cost of said improvement of said street, except the proportion thereof of occupied by street and alley crossings, shall be assessed per linear front foot against the real estate abutting thereon, and shall be paid in ten annual installments to each of which shall be added interest at six per cent, payable semi-annually from the date of final estimate herein, and collected as provided by law.

A bond or bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said deferred assessments, unless the property owners pay their assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in the act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8th, 1881.

Sec. III. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its legal publication.
