## HOW TO VOTE.

If you want to vote a straight ticket, stamp the square to the left of the name of each candidate for whom you wish to vote; that is your straight ticket. If you want to vote a "Republican Ticket," be careful about this. Some think that they should stamp the square to the left of the name of the Secretary of State in order to vote the straight ticket; but a ticket stamped that way would be counted for the Secretary of State.

Don't forget that the way to vote a straight ticket is to stamp the square at the left of the words "Republican Ticket."

Again: You can vote a mixed ticket in either of two ways: 1. You can do it by stamping the square to the left of the name of each candidate for whom you want to vote on whatever list of candidates it may be. 2. You can stamp the square to the left of the name of every candidate and also stamp the square to the left of the person on any other ticket for whom you wish to vote.

But an inspection of that report shows that he charged the county \$4 per day for every day (except one) from March 1st till the convention on May 10—Sundays excepted.
