Indiana's Big University.

Solving the Question of an Individual Curriculum.

President John M. Conner, of the State University, reports a very flourishing condition of affairs at the State University this fall. The number of students who have already signed an intention of attending the University this year is far beyond the number of any preceding year. The vacancies made in the faculty last spring by the resignation of President Jordan and the professors he took with him to Stanford University have been filled.

"Do you know," he said to the News reporter, "that the Indiana University has more perfectly solved the problem of giving to each student what he individually needs than has any other university in the United States? Well, it is true. I can talk freely about it because I had nothing whatever to do with the matter. I know that for several years I regarded its scheme of study as the ideal college curriculum, but until this summer I did not know how widely that opinion was shared. At the meeting of educators at Toronto this summer papers were read by leading men from great Eastern colleges and in several instances they referred to the Indiana University in terms of the highest praise. An Indiana man abroad who inquires will be surprised to learn how well our State University is known."

World Food Supply.

Recent reports of wheat and flour supply, in the face of the fact that the American Agricultural, and the fact of the importance of wheat to both America and Europe. It declares that half has not been sold since the European shortage in breadstuffs, which has not been a breadstuffs crop this year would have suffered. According to the latest estimates of production on both at home and abroad, and, even assuming that the United States would export 225,000,000 bushels, there is a deficit in the world's food supply of at least two hundred million bushels of wheat and flour, with a possibility of the shortage being twice as great. Added to this is the almost total failure of the potato crop in Ireland and a serious curtailment in the field of potatoes on the continent. Even with the utmost economy of distribution and an unheard-of conservation of American wheat grain districts is before the needs of Europe.

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What Causes Vertigo.

One of the principal causes of the more serious forms of vertigo, or dizziness, is a diseased condition of the inner portion of the ear, the labyrinth. Vertigo of greater or less severity may result from whatever disturbs the blood pressure, either within the labyrinth or in the middle ear. Similar effects are also produced by false impressions received through the eye, through the sense of touch, and by disease of the spinal cord.

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A Drunken Engineer.

Perkins & Eastern, last night received a dispatch informing him that the engineer of an eastern bound train was drunk and not capable of managing the locomotive. Mr. Palmerston was able to "catch up" with the fellow at New Castle, where he was bounced from the engine and the fireman put in charge until Springfield was reached.
