Bill Dalton's Gang Wiped Out of Existence
-The Dispensary Law of South Carolina
Unconstitutional - A Cyclone Deadly

THE DALTON GANG.

In a Fight With Them Eight Men Are Killed.

Perry (Okla) special: News is received from the terrible fight occurred about forty miles from the nearest town, with the Dalton gang. The noted outlaws, Bill Dalton and Bill Doolan and another outlaw, said to be Bitter Creek, were killed dead on the spot and a woman and her little girl were killed dead, as also were two Deputy Marshals.

Marshall Court: A posse met Bruce Miller, one of the gang, and the fight commenced. This was on McElroy ranch, fifteen miles this side of Ingalls. Bill Dalton and Bill Doolan were near by when the fight occurred and went to Bruce Miller's assistance and a regular fight took place.

It looks very much like the noted outlaw gang will be wiped out of existence. The price of Bill Dalton's capture dead or alive is \$2,500, the price of Bill Doolan's head is \$1,500. The best officers of the Territory are camping on the outlaws' trail, and the latest news from the field of carnage is that the Dalton gang is a thing of the past. They have terrorized Oklahoma and Southern Kansas for the past four years.

It's Unconstitutional. The dispensing law has been declared unconstitutional, two Supreme Court justices concurring in and one dissenting from the opinion.

The dispensing law, which went into effect July 1, 1882, prohibited the sale of liquor by retail, by any private individual, and provided for an appointment by the Governor of a commissioner whose duty it should be to purchase all such liquors, giving preference to manufacturers and brewers doing business within the State, and to turn them to duly appointed dispensers in each county of the State, who in turn supply them to chasers for consumption. An exception was made in favor of druggists, who were permitted to buy liquor for compounding medicines.

Body Recovered.

The body of John Keer, Jr., who was buried in a surface fall at Bowery mine near Frostburg, Md., Aug. 7, has been found after incessant work day and night since the accident. The mine is the property of the Borden Mining Company, and the occurrence put a stop to shipments of coal entirely. The finding of the body of the dead miner will enable the company to resume operations at once.

Boring for Orders.

Sir Julian Pauncefote, British ambassador, has been furnished an outline of the orders prepared by Secretary Herbert for the government of United States naval commanders of the seal patrol. It is understood that his purpose is to cause similar instructions to be issued to commanders of the British fleet, so that the two fleets may work in harmony in policing Bering Sea.

Opposite Strike.

Columbus (Ohio) special: Preparations for the most extensive strike in the history of coal mining are completed for the official strike called in the coal field by John M. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers of America, is in communication with local officials in every quarter and believes from the reports received that nearly 225,000 will quit work.

The Stars and Stripes at Nicaragua.

Death of General Stevens.

Friday had been less critical than formerly, and all his attendants had evidently expected his recovery. He died a peaceful death, perfectly conscious of his surroundings.

SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Our National Law-Makers and What They Are Doing for the Good of the Country - Various Measures Proposed, Discussed, and Acted Upon.

Doings of Congress.

Both sides of the chamber showed a good deal of activity yesterday. During the transaction of the routine mowing business Senator Kyle, of South Dakota, introduced a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment which referred to the Committee on Judiciary. The urgent deficiency bill was taken up and the last paragraph, to provide for uniformity in the election of senators, which struck for supplies at Washington, gave rise to considerable discussion, as did also the paragraph for the printing of an abstract of the acts of the Senate and the House motion to strike out the clause, as he argued that the abstract would be, as a duplication of the digest already ordered.

The action on the joint resolution was about to be put in its final passage when the hour of 1 o'clock arrived and the question was over, while the Senate adjourned, having sent the Senate bill to the House.

When the House adjourned it was still in a most distressing tangle. The rule which the committee on rules brought in, imposing a limit of 100 hours on the debate, was voted down, and the bill was the cause of the trouble. No business had been transacted.

Very few Senators assembled Friday to speak. The struggle over the adoption of the new rule to secure a voting quorum was resumed when the House met. As soon as the journal had been read, the House adjourned, and the session was adjourned when Mr. Dockery moved its approval the Republicans sat silent in their seats.
