DOINGS OF THE DAY.

SUMMARY OF THE NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Latest Returns from the Fall Elections—A Famous Ball Player Dead—Cremated While Blasting Up a Wound—Mexicans Alarmed at a Volcano Eruption.

The Election.
Returns received up to Friday noon shows the following result:
NEW YORK.

The total vote of the State on Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Judges of the Court of Appeals is as follows: For Governor—Morton, 570,501; Hill, 513,720; Wheeler, 23,035. Morton's plurality, 156,781.
For Lieutenant Governor—Saxton, 662,988; Lockwood, 537,164. Saxton's plurality, 125,824.
For Judges of the Court of Appeals—Haig, 459,511; Brown, 428,720. Haig's plurality, 130,791.
The official vote of New York City for mayor is as follows: Hugh L. Grant, (Tammany,) 107,778; Lucien S. Ball, (soc.), 7,181; James McCullom, (Pro.), 288; George Gethlen, (Pro.), 35. Strong's plurality, 44,265. The uncertainty about the Board of Aldermen was removed by the police returns, which gave the Republicans 17 out of the 31 members. The Board will have the apportionment of the city for assembly districts.

KANSAS.
The latest figures at State political headquarters show that Kansas has elected seven Republican Congressmen and one Populist, William Baker, in the Sixth District. The latter district, however, is so close that a contest is likely. Chairman Brodhead of the Populist State Central Committee concedes the defeat of Jerry Simpson and all the Populist Congressional nominees except Baker. The Legislature will be Republican on joint ballot by about 55. Morrill's majority is about 30,000.

TENNESSEE.
The Governorship is still in doubt, both the Republicans and Democrats claiming the victory. Several counties heard from official returns, which give Evans (Rep.) 3,000 majority. Of the counties yet to be heard from it is conceded that they are about evenly divided. It looks as much as if Evans was elected, but the result can only be learned by the official count. The Legislature is safely Democratic.

TEXAS.
This State is claimed by both parties. The Populists claim a plurality of 80,000 for Nugent, while the Democrats only claim the State for Culberson by 30,000. The Democratic strongholds have been heard from, while the Populists are yet to hear returns from the country districts.

OHIO.
Chairman Dick's estimate put the Republican plurality in Ohio at 13,254. It is not believed the official count will vary much from this figure.

IN GENERAL.
The Republicans carried every Northern State and secured a majority in the West. Virginia Legislature which will return a Republican United States Senator.

VICTORY IS OURS!

Republicans Sweep the Country from Coast to Coast.

REGULAR LANDSLIDE

Democrats Don't Even Claim a Close Fight.

Bill in New York, Peck in Wisconsin, McVeigh in Illinois, White in Colorado, Wilson in West Virginia, Simpson in Kansas, and a Score of Other Notables Go Down—Congress—Surely Republican in Both Branches—Nearly All State Legislatures of the Same Stripe.

The country is ours. Republicans have marched in triumph from Massachusetts to California and have captured all the enemy's strongholds on this way. It was a landslide. The considerable verdict of 1-2 was reversed with a whoop. Two years ago the Republicans lost Illinois by 2,900, Indiana by 7,125, New York by 45,518, Wisconsin by 6,544, and saved Ohio only by a narrow margin of 1,072 Republican plurality. This year every State has been reclaimed. Illinois by 70,000, Indiana by 40,000, New York by 170,000, Wisconsin by 70,000, Colorado by 20,000, Ohio increased her great Republican majority of last year, and Michigan, Massachusetts, and Iowa their majorities of two years ago.

Two years ago 176 Republicans elected only 17 of the 47 members of Congress and lost the Legislatures in enough States to give the Democrats control of the Senate. Now they have regained nearly every lost Republican district and carried many of the strongest Democratic districts by large majorities, defeating Wilson in West Virginia, and invading the no man's land South. The Republican tidal wave seems to have involved more or less all the States holding elections, increasing Republican majorities in Republican districts and decreasing or wiping out Democratic majorities in Democratic States.

It is a great victory, and as significant as it is great. It means that the people, having tried the Democratic party with full power, repudiate national and State administrations, and give the Republican a vote of confidence. It means repudiation of free trade and free trade methods, and a ringing endorsement of protection and other fundamental principles of Republicanism. It means that stagnated business and lack of employment have had their effect on the people. The men who voted for Cleveland's promise of high wages and cheap foreign goods, have found out that the two things do not go together. They have seen that goods, but they have not the wages with which to buy them. This discovery that Democratic pledges are to be trusted has been made not only by the workingmen of the North, but by the industrial districts of the South. West Virginia does not sympathize with Charleston Wilson in his demand for free trade in coal and iron.

NEWS OF THE BATTLE.
Reports from all over the country tell of the result.
The Republican have swept everything in sight in Wisconsin, with the exception of a few Legislative and Senate districts. They have elected Mayor W. H. Upham Governor by from 15,000 to 20,000 plurality, and with him goes the Republican ticket. They have elected 12 of 10 Congressmen. In the next Legislature the Republicans will have a clean working majority in the lower house, but the Senate will probably be in dispute until the official returns are received. The State Senate will be bitterly fought for, as without it the Republicans cannot redistrict the State and break that they now demand as a "gerrymander."

Chairman Wilson is Defeated.
The result in West Virginia is as much a surprise to the Democrats as to the Democrats. The landslide seems to have reached every district, with the possible exception of the Third, which the Democrats still claim. In the Second District returns are coming in very slowly. Mr. Wilson, Dem., is undoubtedly defeated, but the indications are that the majority against him will be small. Dayton, Rep., has made gains at all points heard from, but the 0 are all on the railroad, and this was expected. The gains are larger, however, than the Republicans had counted on to give them the district by two.

These gains are distributed as follows: West Virginia, 3; New York, 12; Massachusetts, 4; Maryland, 3; Kentucky, 2; Pennsylvania, 3; Illinois, 3; New Jersey, 3; Connecticut, 3; Kansas, 1; Ohio, 1; Indiana, 1; North Carolina, 1; Rhode Island, 2; Michigan, 3; Colorado, 1; Wisconsin, 1; Utah, 3.

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reported, but the returns at hand indicate that Tulel will have at least 600,000 over four years. North Dakota is Republican.
North Dakota returns so far show Allen (Rep.) for Governor, running ahead of the ticket. The Republicans gain in Fargo, Grand Forks, Bismarck and all other large towns, while in some country precincts the Populists gain slightly. Allen's election by 5,000 plurality is claimed by the Republican Central Committee. The Democrats concede it by about 1,000. M. H. Johnson, Rep., is re-elected to Congress.

Heavy Republican Gains were shown in Iowa from the start, and the state committee claims its entire State ticket by a plurality and ten Congressmen will be elected with a probability of defeating Hayes, Democrat, and sending a solid delegation to Washington.

The Indiana Association State Committee give up the struggle. It looks as if the Republican majority in the State might reach 2,000. The Republicans have already elected eight, and perhaps more, members of Congress.

Vote of Massachusetts.
Massachusetts is carried by Greenhalgh, Rep., by over 10,000. The Republicans have elected eleven Congressmen. There was a slump of 10 percent in the Democratic vote in Boston and a Republican vote of 10 percent.

Two Republican Senators.
In Wyoming a full vote was polled. The indications are that the full Republican State ticket is elected and that the Legislature will be Republican with a probability of two Republican United States Senators.

Utah's election passed off quietly, and a large vote was polled. Republican estimates are that Cannon, Rep., will carry a single state, 14 or more, and 100 Congressmen. This is not conceded by the Democrats.

Results in Connecticut.
Connecticut returns thus far heard from show a slight Republican gain and a large falling off in the Democratic vote. It is evident that the vote will be very close and it is doubtful if there will be an election by the returns.

Results from Rhode Island.
Complete returns have not been received from either of the Congressional districts in Rhode Island, but the figures at hand leave no doubt of the success of Hall, Republican, ex-Lieutenant Governor, in the First District, and Arnold, Republican, over Garvin, Democrat, in the Second District. The receipt of returns from various towns is hampered by the prohibition of the wires on account of the storm, but all the returns received have the Republican trend indicated in the dispatches from other States.

Close Race in Kansas.
Incomplete returns from one-third of Kansas indicate the election of Broderick, Rep., in the First Congressional District; C. L. Miller, Rep., in the Second; S. Kirkpatrick, Rep., in the Third; Charles Curtis, in the Fourth. It now looks as if Jerry Simpson was beaten.

News from New Hampshire.
