## NEWS IN BRIEF GUSTS

BLOWN IN FROM ALL PARTS OF THE EARTH.

An Important Record of the Week As Told by the Telegraph—Latest from Foreign Shores—Crimes, Com- munities, Fires, Etc.

**Ex-Governor Matthews Stricken.**

A special from Lafayette, Ind., says: "Former Governor Claude Matthews was stricken with paralysis at Mechanicsburg, while he was on a visit to an old settler's meeting. Gov. Matthews had just concluded his address when stricken. Mr. Matthews spoke for about an hour in an easy manner, when he was noticed to stop and waver for an instant. Placing his hand to his forehead, he said: 'I am failing, I am failing.' He then staggered for a moment. He was about to sink to the floor when several of those present rushed to his aid, and supporting him, hurried him to the platform and stretched him full length upon the ground. Medical aid quickly reached him. His entire right side was paralyzed. While he could apparently understand questions put to him he could not reply. The doctors think he is gradually growing worse and anticipate a fatal ending."

**Most Fug Spanish Party at Havana.**

The Spanish colonial authorities at Havana, while they have decided that most of the rebels, who are not rebels as defined by the American forces is to be considered foreign and thus subjected to custom house duties, have taken under special consideration the future of the agricultural products and manufactured industries of Cuba, in view of the Madrid Government's modus vivendi with the American Government regarding the same, leaving the outfit in bond pending a decision from Madrid.

**Candidate Killed.**

Hon. Thomas M. Adams, Democratic nominee for the Legislature, has been assassinated at Giles, a town city in Chattooga County, Georgia. The deed was committed in a general row at a political gathering.

Mr. DeLoach, a school-teacher, DeLoach, and William Bayley, Populist nominee for the Legislature, precipitated a general fight, in which several shots were fired. Mr. Adams was a bystander and received one bullet in the temple and one in the heart. Mr. Adams was very popular.

**Disastrous Fire.**

Two fires in New York City caused a loss of about \$300,000. The first was at Jacob Hirsch's bank, and it was caused by an explosion of an ammonia tank. The loss is \$250,000. The second fire was of incendiary origin. A double fat on the east side burned. It was occupied by 200 persons, all asleep. There were 150 killed, and the Max Stein fall down stairs and was fatally hurt. The loss was about \$50,000.

**Came in Side by Side.**

A Havana dispatch says the cruiser Indiana has arrived at Gibara Tuesday, and the battleship Indiana, which immediately preceded her, both having been prepared for battle. The commander of the Indiana informed the Nashville that the protocol had been signed. The crew of the latter burst into cheers. The two warships proceeded to Gibara.

**Bank Robber Arrested.**

Sheriff Snow of Kalamazoo, has arrived in Chicago to take Hacko Wagner, the alleged bank robber, to Richland, Mich. The Sheriff says he is positive of Wagner's guilt. A telegram from Cleveland says: "Doubt Ryan, another suspect, has been arrested there. The Richland Bank was robbed of \$25,000 in currency, notes and stamps.

**Archbishop Ireland.**

It is reported that Archbishop Ireland will be succeeded by the Bishop of Manila and Archbishop John Keene to the see of San Juan. Their ardent Americanism will prevent friction of the church and state.

**Attempt to Break the Roosevelt Boom.**

Gov. Black's friends in New York are preparing to burst the Roosevelt boom on the ground that the Governor is entitled to renomination.

**Church Destroyed by Fire.**

The Baptist Church at Ashtabula, Ohio, was destroyed by fire, believed to have been of incendiary origin. The church facades have had considerable trouble lately.

**Boys Drowned.**

At New Albany, Ind., Will and James Mason aged 9 and 11 years, were drowned in a pond while swimming. The bodies were recovered.

**War Relief.**

Hele Gould has given \$25,000 to the Woman's War Relief Association.

**"I Am Satisfied."**

Manila special: Agricola, the insur- gent leader, has yielded everything, and not only yielded to the Americans, but proclaims that he is satisfied. In a long message he says: "I am satisfied with American occupation. The Filipinos are disbanding."

**Town Destroyed.**

Berlin special: A man, a man, a man, was completely destroyed by a tornado. The church was demolished. The damage to business and real property is several million marks.

**Damage to Illinois Town.**

The citizens of Carterville, Ill., were treated the other morning by the fire alarm to find their much-prized city in a blaze. The fire originated in the rear of Lander's saloon, and all of the buildings from the railroad to Elly's store were completely destroyed, with the exception of Hampton's drug store. The loss is estimated at \$250,000.

**Mrs. Marrett and Little One.**

Mrs. Kate Marrett, 28 years old, of New York, killed herself and her two children, Catherine, 4 years of age, and James V., 18 months old, by means of gas. She had been despondent for some time. The bodies were found by the hands of the woman.

**Reviving Murder in Paris.**

A man of the name of Deblair, living in Paris, murdered his two children in a most brutal manner. He took them to a stone wall, placed bandages over their eyes, and then seized them by the legs, battered them until they were dead.

**Killed in a Tunnel.**

Eight men were killed and five more injured, two fatally, at the Carnegie tunnel on the Charters division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, near Pittsburgh. The accident was due to the fall of the tunnel caving in on a number of workmen.

## LOSSES IN THE WAR.

SMALL NUMBER OF AMERICANS WERE KILLED.

Spain's Loss of Men Was Many Times What Ours Was, and She Has Parted with Much Valuable Property—Estimate of Losses in Both Armies.

Casualties Were Few. Washington correspondent.

THE Army and Navy Departments are in possession of nearly complete lists of casualties on the American side, and of more or less accurate lists of Spanish losses. The Spaniards lost 114 men, and 21 officers, 205 enlisted men and 77 officers, and 1,397 enlisted men were wounded. At that time, 214 enlisted men, of whom many have since been found, were reported missing.

In the destruction of Cuban forces on July 3, Capt. Young, George H. Ellis and Capt. Aspinwall, of the 1st Cavalry, were killed, and Capt. Edward C. Vining, of the 21st Cavalry, was wounded. In the subsequent mutiny of Spanish prisoners on the Harvard six of them were killed and 15 wounded. The loss with the Spanish cruiser Alfonso XII is unknown.

Winton, Callander of New York, a brother of Col. Wm. Astor, was wounded in the right arm July 5, while commanding a force of 25 rough riders sent to capture the Cuban rebels.

Gun Miles, after effecting his landing in Porto Rico, at Guanica, had such a gratifying time of it that there were practically no American casualties. Capt. Gilson Barrett and Capt. John M. Morris, both wounded in a fight before Yauco, where four Spaniards were found dead and several wounded. On Aug. 6 eight privates were wounded at Guanica. One Spaniard was killed and two wounded. Five men were wounded at Asomanta, Lieut. J. P. Haines, Fourth Artillery, and two privates were wounded and a corporal killed. One man was killed at the fort and 15 men wounded near Higueron.

In the fight at Manila July 31, the Spanish loss was estimated at 300 killed and 1,000 wounded, and we lost nine killed, nine seriously wounded, including Capt. Reinhardt Richter, and 34 slightly wounded.

The last casualty in the navy was the destruction of the Konembla, a coal passenger ship on the Bantoc Bancor, who was killed during a recent engagement with Spanish riflemen at a point of land jutting out into Corte bay.

Corporal Swanson was killed by a shell in Gen. Wilson's advance in Porto Rico. Capt. Lee and Lieut. Maines and three privates were wounded. The Spanish loss has not been reported.

**Total Casualties in Both Armies.**

Gen. Vara del Rey of the Spanish forces was one of those killed at El Caney. —

ran on May 7 without sustaining injury. Four days later came the news of the Callendar, who, while the only American naval officer to be killed in the war met his death. The cruiser Wilmot, torpedo boat Winslow and gunboat Hudson had entered the harbor to attack some Spanish gunboats. In the fight a shell burst aboard the Winslow, killing Eugene Worth, and the Callendar, a gunboat of the Spanish navy, was sunk.

Worth, Lee and Callendar included one naval officer, three sailors, two women, three children killed; wounded unknown.

The day of this skirmish was also the day on which the cruiser Marblehead, the gunboat Nashville and the auxiliary cruiser Winsor attacked some Spanish troops behind impounded breastworks at
