EX-VICE-PRESIDENT STEVENS

Famous Marble Groups and Paintings to be Reproduced in the Arena.

Former Vice-President Adlai Stevenson is a devoted admirer of art. His pretty but modest home in Bloomington, Illinois, contains many triumphs in paintings and antique Greek and Roman statuary, which have been reviewed by thousands of prominent people and celebrated artists.

It was while on a visit to the ex-president's home that Mr. John E. Boyle, who at the time was the American representative of the great English Gaynell Company of staine artists, first conceived the idea of inducing his company to adopt for exclusive representation and reproduction the Stevenson collection of statuary and paintings.

Three years of unqualified success attested the wisdom of the policy. London, Berlin and Paris were delighted with the exhibition, receiving it with enthusiastic and tremendous audiences. No sooner had Mr. Boyle become identified with the Adam Forepaugh and Sells Brothers' circus, which will appear here Thursday, October 5, 1899, than he prevailed upon the English company to make an American appearance and the tour so far has equalled, if not exceeded, the remarkable European success.

The delicate, chaste and charming exhibition of the Gaynell Company in reproducing the Stevenson works has been the subject of much praise by the Eastern papers and the press of cities wherever given. The fac-similes of marble groupings and famous paintings and impersonations of favorite gods and goddesses of mythology by the eight lovely ladies of faunus form is everywhere said to be a fitting prelude to the lavish entertainment this year provided by the Forepaugh-Sells management.

Notice of Application for License

The undersigned, a male person over the age of 21 years, and not a citizen of Bloomington township, Monroe county, State of Indiana, for the last past five years, hereby gives notice to the citizens of the city of Bloomington, Indiana, and of the First Ward of said city of Bloomington and of Bloomington, Monroe county, Indiana, and of the State of Indiana, that he will at the October Term, 1899, of the Board of Commissioners of the county of Monroe and State of Indiana, apply to said Board for a license to sell intoxicating liquors, to-wit: Spirits, vinegars and malt liquors, in less quantities than five gallons at a time and in less quantities than one-half gallon at a time, for a period of one year with the privilege of allowing the same to be drunk on the premises where said is.

The said premises upon which he desires to sell said spirituous, vinous and malt liquors, being situated in the First Ward of said city of Bloomington, Monroe county, Indiana, and of the State of Indiana, bounded as follows:

In the front room 18 feet 4 inches wide, by 28 feet 9 inches long, inside measurement, located in the first story and on the ground floor of the two-story frame, shingle roof building, located on the south line of lot No. 100, bounded on the east line of lot No. 101, and on the west line of lot No. 102, and lot No. 103, the south line on a line parallel with the east line of said lot of one hundred and fifty-seven (157) in the city of Bloomington, Monroe county, Indiana, bounded and described as follows, to-wit: beginning at the southeast corner of said lot running thence north on the east line thereof one hundred and thirty-two (132) feet to the south line of said lot, thence west on the south line of said lot one hundred and thirty-two (132) feet, thence north on the east line of said lot one hundred and twenty-two (122) feet to the place of beginning.

The said room is so arranged with glass doors and windows that the whole of said room is in view from the street, and no blinds, screens or obstructions are so placed as to prevent a full view of the inside during hours prohibited by law, and said room can be securely closed and locked and all admission prevented.</
