This Date in History—April 29.

1461—Edward IV of England  
born at Rouen, died April 9, 1483, he established the  
House of York on the  
throne, ordered "No Quar-  
ter" at Towton, and 30,000  
Lancastrians were slain.

1676—Michael de Ruyter,  
Dutch admiral, died.

1802—Battle in Italy begun by  
Austrian army crossing  
the Sicilia.

1802—Battle at Bridgeport, Edward IV,  
Ala., General O. M. Mitchell commanding  
Federal.

1802—French bombardment of Grand Gulf,  
Miss., Granta-Vicksburg campaign.

1804—Battle at Princeton, Ark.

1808—Gladstone ministry formed.

It is now announced that Mr. Blaine  
will soon come out with a most positive  
refusal to allow his name to be used

The editor of the Macomb (Ill.) By-  
Standar says that when the McKinley  
law was first passed he thought it would  
be hurtful to the best interests of the  
country, and so declared, but now he  
says:

"In this opinion we were greatly mis-  
taken, and now we have every reason to  
believe the measure is one of the very  
best ever passed by the national legis-  
lature. The first great benefit derived  
is the cheapening of sugar, and other  
equally important features of the bill  
will doubtless work for the good of the  
whole people."

A large number of people are mak-  
ing such revisions of opinions regarding  
the present tariff law.

The Philadelphia *Times* shows how  
the local building association may pros-  
per and give shareholders a fair profit  
on their deposits while the national as-  
sociation which offers large interest on  
investments must fail. "In the latter,"

it says, "the expenses absorb the profits,  
and in the former there are practically  
no expense." The national associations  
have presidents, secretaries &c., drawing  
large salaries. In local associations  
no one except the secretary gets any  
pay. The *Times* says:

"Men do not devote their entire time  
—can not do it, in fact—to an enter-  
prise of this kind (national associations)  
without compensation, let their intentions  
be ever so honest. The only condition  
upon which the building and  
loan association can be made profitable  
to shareholders is that of mutual organ-  
ization for the general benefit, the share-  
holders meeting once a month to pay  
their dues, and employing a secretary  
who is paid for the time he actually  
spends in his work. This condition  
does not and can not exist in connection  
with the national associations, thus ren-  
dering it practically impossible that they  
can be either as safe or profitable  
as the local associations."

A VERITABLE curiosity has been cap-  
tured in Africa. It is an elephant,  
larger than the late lamented Jumbo, pea-green  
in color, trunkless, and has  
tusks that branch out something like  
the horns of a deer. It is in possession
