1804—Charles Adolphus, King of Sweden, the first champion born in Stockholm, killed at Lutzen, Nov. 16, 1626.

1805—John Milton, the poet, born in London, died there, Nov. 13, 1674.

1806—Sir Anthony Van Dyck, Flemish painter, died in London; born in Antwerp, 1599.

1824—Battle of Ayacucho and victory of the

Spanish "Philanthropists" but known in the far

as "Chivatino's Victory." The First

Colorado cavalry, led by Colonel J. M. Chivatino, slaughtered 500 Indians. Battle at

Cuyler's Plantation and Monteith Swamp,
