This Date in History - Jan. 6.

1360 - Richard II. of England born in Bordeaux, France; murdered in Pontefract castle in 1399.
1730 - David Dale, philanthropist, born in Ayrshire, Scot-land; died in Glasgow, 1806; his daughter married the socialist, Robert Owen, and became the mother of Rob-ert Dale Owen and others.
1810 - Richard Owen, soldier and scientist, born in Lac, OWEN LOVELY, knighted, Scotland; he served the United States in the Mexican and civil war.
1811 - Owen Lovely and Charles Sumner, famous abolitionists and colleagues in con-gress, were born, the former in Albion, Me., and the latter in Boston. I. enjoy died in 1884 and Sumner in 1874.
1840 - Mine d'Archiay, famous as Fannie Bur-ney, died from 1832 her first novel, "Eve-lina" was the sensation of the day, and long lines of handsome carriages stood at the bookseller's door, each proprietor waiting his turn to buy a volume.
1857 - The state capitol at Montpelier, Vt., was totally destroyed by fire.
1860 - Jonathan E. Sargent, ex-chief justice of New Hampshire, died in Concord, aged 73.



The Brazil Democrat has announced the candidacy of Senator George A. Byrd for Congress before the next Demo-cratic convention. SAM HARRIS and Basil Ledgerwood, who pleaded guilty to being accomplices in the burning of the Daviess county court house last October, were brought before Judge Hefron yester-day on a plea for arrest of judgment. He overruled the motion, without argu-ment and sentenced them to each seven-teen years in the Southern Prison. The trial of Lavelle and Haves as principals will come up at Petersburg, Pike coun-ty, in March. This sentence of the ne-cessaries has caused quite a commotion in the camp.

NEXT Saturday, January 9, the Re-publican township conventions will be held. The purpose of the conventions is to select committeemen for each pre-inct in the county and to choose dele-gates to attend the district convention at Terre Haute on the 21st, inst. REPRESENTATIVE BROOKSHIRE, to a Washington Post reporter, said the fol-lowing of the late Thomas B. Ward:

"His memory deserves more than a passing notice. Nature had blessed him with a rich dower of all the qualities that fascinate men. In amiability of character he was the peer of the best of earth, and all that was lovable in human nature was exemplified in Tom Ward. Though an uncompromising Democrat, he was controlled by a sense of duty and controlled by the opposition, and won a seat in Congress over that distinguished Republican, Godlove S. Orth, overcoming a large Republican majority by the sheer force of personal popularity. His ability on the bench, before a jury, and in the House of Representatives was un-questioned. No better lawyer than Ward ever lived in the Wabash region, the bar of which would stand comparison with any in the Union. His great ability as an advocate was clearly shown in several intricate contested election cases dur-ing his Congressional career. But his learning was not confined to his pro-fession. He was a superb scholar, familiar with many languages, and a most omnivorous reader never lived. I actually believe he had read nearly every book in the Congressional Library. His style of oratory was ingersollian. His speeches were prose poems shining with epigrams and of lofty strain. Hon. Thomas A. Hendricks loved him don-edly and often spoke of his wonderful intellect. In fact, he was beloved by everybody, and many an eye moistened and many a heart beat sadly when the news came that Tom Ward was no more."

INDIANA.

Interesting Bits of News from Various Towns.

Bribe Money Locked Up.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 6. - An ugly scandal has grown out of the purchase of a new site for the state fair by the state board of agriculture. The charge is that an effort was made to bribe at least two members of the board to vote for a certain farm as a site for the state fair. As the story is currently related a person or persons, interested in the sale of a cer-tain farm to the board offered two members \$500 each to vote for that farm. The would-be purchaser of the votes went so far as to place the \$1,000 where it could be received by the two members of the board. After the money had been placed within reach of the members they voted for another site, and the money was never called for. This is the \$1,000 now locked up in the state board's safe. Neither the members of the board for whom it was intended nor the would-be purchas-ers of votes will call for it.

Victims of La Grippe.

WARSAW, Ind., Jan. 6. - La grippe has besieged this city until the disease, in its more mild form, has prostrated hundreds of our citizens. It is esti-mated that there are 300 cases here, and unless this severe weather abates the disease will, it is feared, reach an epidemic. The death roll for the past two weeks has been the largest ever known here.

FRANKLIN, Ind., Jan. 6. - Monday the following deaths from la grippe oc-curred: Mrs. Susan Thompson, aged 91, sick eighteen hours; William Holes, aged 80 years, and John Stock, aged 82.

PERRY, Ind., Jan. 6. - The grip epidemic is assuming alarming propor-tions in this city, the deaths and criti-cal cases being double the number five days ago. Fully 15 per cent. of the 2,000 are in a dangerous condition. Business is seriously impeded.

The Experiment a Success.

LA PORTE, Ind., Jan. 6. - The experi-ment of treating Ernest Schmitz, of this city, the young lad who was frightfully burned with gasoline last summer and whose burns refused to heal, by skin-grafting is a pro-nounced success. The skin was fur-nished by Miss Lena Johnson, the patient and his two brothers. The operation was performed the latter part of December, and eight grafts, ranging from 1 to 3 inches in length and one-half inch in width, were made. Each graft has so spread as to cover nearly, if not quite, the entire surface of the wound, and producing one of the most perfect results possible.

Myers Doesn't Want to Be Governor.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 6. - The democratic gubernatorial situation has been changed some by W. R. Myers, of Anderson, withdrawing from the race and declaring himself a candidate for clerk of the supreme court. It is believed that Secretary of State, Matthews' candidacy for governor will be benefited by Mr. Myers change of base. Congressmen Harman, gave his turning to Washington, gave his friends to understand that he would ac-cept a nomination for governor, but would not ask for it.

Sued for Damages.

COLUMBUS, Ind., Jan. 6. - Francis L. Droneberger, of this city, has brought suit in the Johnson circuit court against M. L. Cohee, a prominent mer-chant of Edinburg, for \$2,000 damages for alienating his wife's affections, helping her to procure a divorce and then marrying her. Cohee has two divorced wives, living in Hope near here. Both Cohee and Droneberger have grown-up children and are quite wealthy and influential.

The Plymouth Inebriate Asylum.

WARSAW, Ind., Jan. 6. - The Ply-mouth inebriate institute has leased the large sanitarium building owned by S. W. Oldfather in this city, and all of the patients will be removed here within this week. This institute is the only one in successful competition with the Keeley chloride of gold cure in existence.

Tired of Life.

FRANKFORT, Ind., Jan. 6. - John Al-len, a timber merchant, committed sui-cide here Tuesday morning by taking arsenic. Allen's health has been poor for several years and after taking the drug he said to his wife: "My head has failed me and I am no longer able to work for you and the children."

Indianapolis Burglar Caught.

CHICAGO, Ind., Jan. 6. - John Connors, who had been bound to the criminal court at Indianapolis on a charge of burg-lary, was arrested by Officers Conway and Grove, of the Central station Tuesday night. Sheriff Langenberg-er, of Indianapolis, will arrive this morn-ing to take Connors back.

Saved from the Lynchers.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 6. - Talton Hall, who has killed many persons in cold blood, has been removed from Gladesville jail to save his neck. A mob organized and would have hanged him. He advanced on the jail, and was so wild and excited that they set fire to the structure. Hall was removed to Wixena in a close-covered wagon. The people of that section are very angry.

Financially Embarrassed.

BOSTON, Jan. 6. - The Brooks Bank Note Company, of this city, is finan-cially embarrassed, and an attachment has been placed upon the plant by the president, Frank W. Dexter. The lia-bilities are estimated at about \$50,000, and the assets about one-half that figure.

Free Delivery at Mattoon, Ill.

MATTUON, Ill., Jan. 6. - Mattoon peo-ple were treated to their first free de-livery mail service Monday, four regular and two extra carriers being required to do the work. It is estimated that there are 300 persons ill with the grip at Cairo, Ill. Three persons died Monday.
