This Date in History—Jan. 23.

1570—James, Earl of Moray (Murray), regent of Scotland during the imprisonment of Queen Elizabeth, his half-sister, assassinated at Linlithgow, born about 1533; illegitimate son of James V.

1802—William Pitt, statesman, died at Putney of deposition caused by the defeat of the allies at Austerlitz; born 1759.

1842—John Burritt, radical and eccentric British statesman, born 1791; father of the famous Barnard Burritt Courts, who was disinherited, but received the immense fortune of her grandfather Burritt by the generosity of an actress who died late in life.

1852—M. de Bousquet, Russian minister at Washington, died there.

1755—Julius Charles Hare, archdeacon in and defender of the Church of England, died; born 1706.

1777—Unrest lent fall of snow in all of the far western part of the United States; the Union Pacific railway was blocked for six weeks.
