INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 25. - It has been discovered that the day selected for the democratic state convention is the anniversary of the assassination of President Lincoln, and that it occurs in holy week and is the day before Good Friday. In view of all these considerations and the pressure that is being brought it is not improbable that the date will be reconsidered and changed. The letters that are pouring in daily at committee headquarters are bringing to bear a pressure which it would be unwise to ignore. It is altogether probable that within the next few days the chairman will issue a call for a special meeting of the state committee for the purpose of hearing and considering these protests. Should the meeting be called the date will in all probability be changed and a compromise date fixed, which will be from the middle to the last of May.
