The Hoosier State Furnishes Interesting Bits of News.

To Instruct Indiana Voters.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 7.—Under the direction of their state committees the republicans and democrats will carry on schools of instruction in every voting precinct of the state. Within the next week several of ballots will be sent out. While each committee has prepared its own sample ballot the ballots and instructions thereon are the same. Neither party furnishes information as to how to vote a mixed ticket. The committees fear that there will be a good deal of confusion in voting under the new law, as it is the first presidential election since it was enacted. This year there will be two ballot boxes and two ballots to be voted. One box, painted red, will be for the state ballots, which will be on red paper, and the other box, painted white, will be for the local ballots. The law requires that the ballots be folded separately. The state tickets, containing the names of the presidential electors also, is over 2 feet in length. Little scratching is expected.

Wrote Naughty Letters.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 7.—Daniel Lease, an employe for several years past of the Standard Oil Company at Whiting, has been arrested by a deputy United States marshal and brought to South Bend on the charge of writing obscene letters and sending them through the mails. They were written to his wife, who left him about two years ago, and went to Ohio City, her former home. She turned the letter over to a post office inspector and Lease was arrested. He acknowledged writing the obscene epistles to his wife, and was bound over by the United States commissioner in the sum of \$200, and was taken to jail to await trial at the May term of the court.

To Hear the Indiana Case.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 6.—The joint motion asking the supreme court to reconsider its order postponing the consideration of the motion to advance the apportionment suit on the calendar was on Thursday overruled by the supreme court, and October 11 was fixed as the time for the hearing.

WABASH, Ind., Oct. 7.—Suit was begun Thursday afternoon in the Kosciusko circuit court to set aside the apportionments of Indiana for legislative purposes in 1885 and 1891. The action is in all respects similar to the suits which have been appealed to the supreme court under the apportionment of 1885.

LOGANSPORT, Ind., Oct. 7.—The state meeting of the Indiana Baptists passed strong resolutions Thursday against keeping the world's fair open on Sunday and resolved to try to defeat for reelection any congressman who attempts to have stricken out of the law the Sunday closing clause.

FLOODS IN SOUTHERN EUROPE.

Great Damage Wrought in Italy and France.

PARIS, Oct. 7.—A hurricane prevailed Thursday in Valencia and Nimes. Serious floods are reported at both places.

ROME, Oct. 7.—Railway communication between Sondrio and Colico, in the lake region of Italy, has been stopped by floods.

GENOA, Oct. 7.—The Hagano, which passes the eastern walls of the city, overflowed its banks owing to the recent heavy rains having greatly swollen the stream. The water spread over a considerable area in the vicinity of the river and invaded two courts of the Columbian exhibition, seriously damaging the exhibits. The lower part of the city was completely flooded, and it is feared that the loss resulting from the inundation will be heavy.

HILLSBORO, Ill., Oct. 7.—James Stokes, residing near Elmore, was held up by highway robbers and relieved of over \$1,000.
