No Information Bureau.

The postoffice is no longer to be an information bureau. Very sensible orders have been issued by Postmaster General Wamamaker. According to the orders a person connected with the office is not allowed to divulge the place of residence to anyone receiving mail. The postoffice has been greatly harassed by persons calling to ascertain the exact residence of certain parties. The chief source of annoyance in this particular are canvassers and swindlers, who often ask for lists of persons receiving mail at the postoffice. An order regarding the delivery of letters sent out by a pension agency has also been issued. It provides that these letters are to be delivered only into the hands of the person addressed or to a very near member of the family, such as a wife, daughter or son. No one else will be trusted with the letter.

Dead Beats.

The candidates on both tickets are being besieged by an army of beats in quest of money to influence voters and to dispense "sweet charity." The dead beats usually claim to be pure patriots and to show that they are what they purport to be display "references" from parties as unknown as themselves. One of the Democratic candidates, who in an unwary hour opened up his heart and gave an applicant a little money, has been nearly run to death ever since by the eager vandals who seem to consider him as easy picking. In this, however, they have been disappointed for the candidate is now addicted to saying: "Am awfully sorry but I just gave out my last cash a little while before you came in."

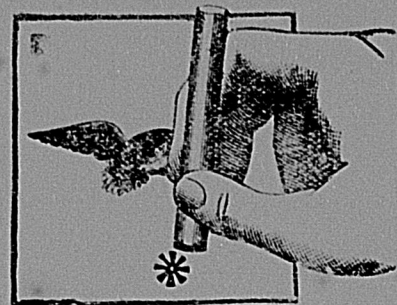
