The wild-cat has had its tail cut off just behind the ears.

The Democrats were the third party in the Oregon election.

Baccalaureate sermons are now ripe and ready to pluck.

How that sugar did stick to the Senatorial fingers that were dipped into the barrel.

GENERAL MANSON sent a telegram to Congressman Ryann this morning to the effect that the people out this way were opposed to the Senate tariff bill and that they wanted free sugar.

The wild-cat money bill had 102 votes in its favor, all Democratic. It was killed by the votes of 88 Republicans, 75 Democrats and 9 Populists. Thus another plank in the Chicago platform has been ripped up into kindling wood.

The Republicans of the Ninth District most happily solved their difficulties by nominating Frank Hanley, the brilliant young lawyer of Williamsport, as their candidate for Congress. The district is overrun with statesmen, and this over production was the cause of considerable friction in several counties, which resulted in much bitterness of feeling. Mr. Hanley's nomination on the ninety-third ballot acted like oil upon the troubled waters and made everybody happy. The nominee is but thirty years old, and as an orator has but few equals in the State.

MR. BROOKSHIRE is known to be a dyed-in-the-wool Democrat, but he could not swallow that monstrous proposition in the Democratic platform which sought to inaugurate a free flow of wild-cat money again. Mr. Brookshire is to be commended for having more sense than the Democratic National Convention. Wild-cat money is gone. Free trade is gone, and now how much of this Democratic platform is left? But when did a Democratic platform ever amount to anything but a mere device to catch votes with and then to be kicked over, like a child's cob house?

The following sentences from a speech in the Senate at Washington, by Mr. Wolcott, of Colorado, are receiving praise for their "condensed common sense": "The time has come when those of us who are in public life ought to begin to cultivate more regard for the perpetuity of republican institutions, and to ponder less to that mis-called portion of the labor vote whose labor is always with their throats and never with their hands. It is time we stood up for American manhood, for the right of every man to work if he wants to, if it takes the whole army of the United States to enable him to do so. It is time we had the courage to stand against this socialism, populism and paternalism which is running riot in this country, and which must end, if not crushed, in the destruction of liberties which the law gives us, liberties which should be dearer to us than life itself."

WHEN Henry Watterson, of the Louisville Courier Journal, heard from the Oregon election, and from that election in Illinois, in a district that for the last forty years has been good for 7,000 Democratic majority, the other day flopped and gave a Republican majority of 5,000, he sat down and wrote:

"This is a dreadfully disagreeable sort of a year, anyway. Weather and weather and elections and elections, until it has simply become exasperating. It may be the making of blackberries, but it is rough on Democrats."

"Let up on elections. Boycott elections. Abolish elections."

"Blot elections out of the constitution and swipe the word out of the dictionary. Some people never know when to stop. Nothing is more disgusting than carrying things too far—carrying elections especially."

"There are thousands and thousands of folks in this country who are just plumb tired out at the mere thought of an election. 'Say, what's the good of elections, anyhow?' They ain't so all-fired funny as some jifts seem to think."

And there are thousands of disgusted Democrats all over the country just like Henry Watterson. So thoroughly disgusted are they that the bulk of them will vote the Republican ticket this fall as they evidently must have done in Illinois and Oregon.

A SOMBER CANADIAN LEGEND.

The Story of a Human Being Assuming the Shape of a Wolf.

The werewolf legend constitutes one of the most somber of the traditional beliefs existing in French Canada. The story of a human being assuming a wolf's shape is certainly one of the most generally diffused throughout the world and the werewolf story comes down to us from old Roman times. The French Canadian believes that if a person does not partake of the sacrament for seven years he will turn into a loup-garou—a shapeless animal without head or limbs, the loup-garou might also appropriate the form of a wildcat, a hare, a fox or even a black hen, but at night he was obliged to range through woods and desert places. At dead of night the loup-garou steals from his bed climbing the highest tree in the neighborhood, he hides in its branches, and is instantly transformed into bestial shape. He is endowed with supernatural speed and strength. A fierce creature, with appetites exaggerating those of the animal he resembles, his especial delight is in slaughtering and devouring little children. When he returns to human semblance he may be recognized by his excessive leanness, wild eyes and haggard countenance. In order to regain his estate of humanity it is necessary that the blood of the monster should be shed. This kindly office being performed by a friend a complete restoration results. In many parts of the country cats of three colors were considered lucky, therefore the fortunate possessor of a puss mottled with black, white and gray, should preserve the animal carefully. 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


