

A MAGNIFICENT RAILROAD SCHEME.—The Washington correspondent of the Courier and Enquirer says:

The Committee on Public Lands has before it a railroad project almost rivaling the Mississippi and Pacific rail road. This scheme is for grant of lands to aid in building a road from New Orleans to Fond du Lac on Lake Superior, a distance by the route proposed of about 1,500 miles. The route suggested is from New Orleans to Jackson, Mississippi, thence to Helena, in Arkansas, thence on the west side of the river to St. Paul, Minnesota, crossing the Mississippi again at that point, and thence to Lake Superior. The success of the application for government aid to the great work will depend to some extent upon the policy adopted by Congress in disposing of the public lands. If it be decided to encourage all feasible and necessary enterprises for railroads in the new states, provision will probably be made for the realization of this project, magnificient as it appears to be.
