

HOME AND FOREIGN MARKETS.

Review Office, May 12, 1854.

The grain market is quiet, there being no advance over the prices of last week; the Canada which is now due with a week's later dates, is looked for anxiously. We think we are safe in predicting a considerable rise in breadstuffs on the receipt of her news.

POTATOES.—At present there is none in the market, speculators having made a clean sweep on Thursday last. Accounts from the east speak of a present and prospective scarcity of Potatoes owing to the prevalence of the potato rot, which is destroying a large proportion of the last year's crop. Our farmers may confidently expect a rise.

CHICAGO MARKET.

CHICAGO, May 11, 1854.

The grain market rather drags, and buyers are disposed to hold back. The scarcity of Potatoes has affected our market favorably and we notice a sale for shipment at approved rates.

Flour—City Mills, No. 1, Ex. Sup., \$7.75—No. 2 Family Flour, \$7.25.

Wheat—\$1.40—\$1.35.

Corn—Sales during the week at 47¢/48 cents.

LIVE STOCK MARKET.—The horse market has not been so active during the week, as the arrivals of stock have been light. The demand, however, is good from all quarters, and we expect large sales as soon as the stock comes forward.

BUFFALO MARKET.

BUFFALO, May 10.

Our market is very quiet this morning, and the enquiry for choice lots of Flour is fair, but the scanty supply restricts operations, and has also in a measure checked business.

Flour—No sales in flour beyond small lots in the trade at about yesterday's quotations, which was \$8.25¢/3.37 for ordinary.

Grain—Wheat in fair request, but light stock of choice samples restricts transactions. The only sales we note is 4,700 bushels Milwaukee at \$1.65. Corn, plenty, and continues dull. Sales of 7,000 bushels at 60¢. Oats in good request and firm—stock light. Sales 7,000 bushels at 44¢.
