

WASHINGTON, June 24.
C. W. Welsh has been appointed acting
Secretary of the Navy, during the absence
of Mr. Dobbin.

A dispatch from the U. S. Commissioner
at the Sandwich Islands has been received
at the Foreign department, saying the
Government had thrown itself into the hands
of the United States for protection from the
French, English and other foreign settlers.
The Commissioner had been employed to
accept the Island for the United States, and
assure the government of American protection.

The United States Commissioner accepted
the appointment for the U. S. and gave
assurances of full protection to the Islanders

The Cholera is still spreading in Kentucky and Tennessee. The Louisville *Journal* of yesterday says: "We learn that the cholera has broken out in Shelbyville, and that since Friday, 10 deaths have occurred, among them Judge Short and Mr. Holtzclaw and two sons. The cholera is said also to prevail among the laborers on the Nashville road. Twelve deaths have occurred at Bowling Green. At Fayetteville fifteen deaths had occurred, and the town was deserted. It also has made its appearance in the lower end of Jackson county, Ala. At Nashville, for 24 hours ending on Friday evening, there were 10 interments, of which 7 were cholera.

It is reported very bad at Hickman, Ky. In a population of 1,500 there were six deaths a day, about the 11th. The hotels were all closed and the citizens were rapidly deserting.

of 9,500 bbls State and Western at 6.75@6.50 for
inferior State—6.75@7.25 for common to straight
State.

Grain—Wheat dull—sales 3000 bush red Wisconsin
at 1.50. Rye in fair demand—sales 2000 bush
Jersey at 1.20 delivered. Corn has downward ten-
dency—sales 36,000 bush at 69@75 for unsound 75
@84 for mixed western.

Provisions—There is no improvement in Pork,
but at higher prices—sales 4,200 bbls at 13@14—for
prime mess, 12.50@12.75.

Flour—There was rather better inquiry for
flour this morning at easier prices. Holders
evince more disposition to realize—lower grades
are dull and drooping. Sales 2,000 bbls at 7.50@
\$8.00 for choice and fancy brands Ohio and Michigan.
Included in sales were 1,600 bbls very choice Indiana
Harrison Mills at 7.35, and 400 bbls choice
southern Ohio at 8.37@8.50.

Grain—Wheat continues dull and prices easier—
sales 5,000 bbls Chicago at 1.25. Corn in fair de-
mand and prices are tending down. Rye in limited
request, with sales 600 bush at 93c. Oats plenty and
dull—sales 20,00 bush at 42@43c.

Canal Freights unchanged—12c on corn, 5c on
barley to N. Y.
