

ANOTHER GREAT FIRE.
\$100,000 Worth of Property Burnt at Louisville.

Last night, about 11 o'clock, a fire broke out in the cornmill belonging to H. W. Hawes, on Campbell street, between Jefferson and Green, which was totally destroyed. The flames communicated from the mill to the lumber yard of Messrs. Hulling & Lacy, which contained a large amount of No. 1 lumber, all of which was consumed.— The yard extends to Green street, on the opposite side of which were several frame and brick buildings, which soon became a prey to the devouring element. On the other side of the mill, on Jefferson street, the fire extended to a two story dwelling house and a stable. When he left the scene there were six houses burning on Green street, and two on Jefferson.

Water was not to be had, notwithstanding the almost superhuman efforts of our gallant fire corps, and there was a prospect of the fire extending, *ad infinitum*. It is supposed that it is the work of an incendiary. [Louisville Times, 27th.]

RAILROAD CONSOLIDATION.

According to a previous notice, a meeting of the stockholders of the Cincinnati and Chicago, and Cincinnati, Logansport and Chicago Railroad Companies, was held at New Castle, Indiana, on Thursday last, to consider the propriety of consolidating the two companies; and after a full discussion in regard to the beneficial results of such an act, a vote was taken upon the question, and upwards of thirty-four thousand votes were cast in favor of consolidation, and none against it.
