

ARRIVAL OF THE ILLINOIS.

NEW YORK, March 28.  
The steamer Illinois, from Aspinwall, arrived about 8 o'clock this morning, with California dates to the 5th inst., and nearly 1,200,000 in specie.

The steamer Panama, from San Juan del Sur, had arrived at Panama with one hundred and twenty-five deserters from General Walker's forces, in a most destitute condition. Their passage to the United States was paid by the Costa Rican Government. One hundred left in the Grenada for New Orleans and the remainder are among the passengers on the Illinois.

There is nothing later from Gen. Walker's position.

The Costa Rican papers state that 3,000 troops are to be added to the allied troops. Gen. Carras would march with fifteen hundred men upon Rivas, and one thousand would march against San Juan del Sur with the intention of surrounding Walker's position with 6,000 men. The condition of Walker is universally considered very desperate.

NEW GRENADA.—The latest dates from Bogota state that the propositions of Mr. Morse, our Special Envoy, were under secret consideration, and there seemed to be but little chance of an amicable arrangement. The tone of the press and majority in Congress evinced the bitterest opposition. The publication of what purported to be Mr. Morse's instructions, had created great excitement on the Isthmus. The natives are anxious that the Government shall refuse the propositions, although they expect that the result will be the military occupation of the Isthmus by the United States.

Some deserters from Walker report that his troops have unanimously refused to leave Rivas to fight; but are willing to defend their position.

California papers contain no news of importance. The markets generally are dull. Flour is selling at \$16, with some speculative movements. State stocks dull, and selling nominally at 50c.

The receipts from the mines are meager, owing to the heavy floods throughout the State.

Edward McGowan, exiled from California by the Vigilance Committee, has returned to Sacramento and demanded a trial. A resolution to fix on Sacramento for his trial was under debate.

A special election for Senator in San Francisco resulted in the success of the Vigilance Committee's candidate.

The Supreme Court of California has decided that the Legislature has no authority to appropriate money to pay the interest of the State debt, and the Court will enjoin any attempt to levy a tax for that purpose.

The Senate has passed a resolution that the State honor requires the payment of the State, but a resolution to submit the proposition to the people was lost.

Mr. Bates, late State Treasurer, has been indicted for felony, and his trial commenced the day the steamer left.

A deficit of \$40,000 in the accounts of Estelle, the keeper of the State prison, has been reported, and a legislative committee reports him as unworthy of office in consequence of various gross misdemeanors.

WASHINGTON, March 28.

Mr. Walker this morning had a long interview with gentlemen of Kansas concerning affairs in that Territory, wishing to acquaint himself with all the particulars previous to going there.

ST. LOUIS, March 27.

The Springfield Journal states that nearly a million of the circulation of the stock banks of Illinois has been returned to the Auditor of State and cancelled since the last report to the Legislature. This reduces the circulation of the banks of the State to about five and a half millions.—The amount issued on stock basis was upwards of six and a half millions.

WASHINGTON, March 28.

Postmasters re-appointed: Jacob Carter, Concord, New Hampshire; Reuben S. Cheney, Michigan.

Lieut. Meade's case before the Naval Court of Inquiry is being concluded, having occupied seventeen days. That of Peter Wager, late a master in the navy, will be taken up on Monday.

ST. LOUIS, March 28.

The cause of the explosion last night was the accidental discharge of a pistol into a canister of powder. Three persons were killed, and one severely and several slightly injured. The stocks of both stores were entirely destroyed. Loss upwards of \$50,000.

A large fire occurred at Liberty, Wisconsin, one week ago. Loss \$25,000.

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 28, 1857.—Steamship Isidore arrived to-day from Havana and Key West, with dates to the 25th.

The Isidore brings two companies of artillery under command of Major Arnold from Fort Myers, Florida, bound to New York.

There is no Indian news. No wrecks reported at Key West.

From Havana we learn that the duty on maize and corn has been reduced one-third.

Troops are being concentrated at Havana for embarkation to Mexico. The condition of the Island is prosperous. Weather sultry.

Steamship Grenada had arrived at Havana with one hundred deserters from Walker's army in Nicaragua, bound to New York.

A lawyer, riding through a town stopped at a cottage to enquire his way.—The lady of the house told him he must keep straight on for some time then turn to the right; but said that she herself was going to pass the road he must take, and that if he would wait a few minutes she would show him the way.
