DOUGLAS AT INDIANAPOLIS.

The Little Giant, the people's candidate

for the Presidency, will be at Indianapolis

on the 28th inst. The question now is,

how shall we go and see the great States-

man?

It has been resolved by the Rangers to

go in wagons, and for that purpose they

have concluded to call upon all those who

are provided with teams, to assist them in

visiting Indianapolis, and taking part in

the ceremonies of that occasion. The

plan proposed is, that every Democrat who

is in the possession of a wagon and horses,

to come to Crawfordsville on the morning

of the 27th, prepared with feed and pro-

visions for himself and horses, for three

days; and, if he feels himself able, to bring

provisions for as many as three men for

the same length of time, as there will be

some who would be anxious to go but who

have not the means to enable them to do

so, unless assisted by our Democratic

friends throughout the county.

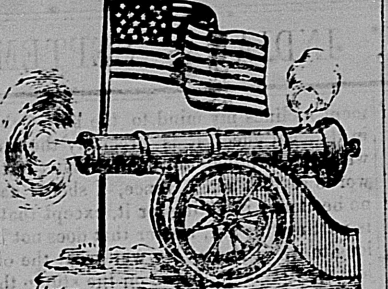
