The News Condenser.

The Emperor of Brazil has visited the scene of warfare between his Empire and Paraguay. He is to have a conference with his two allies, the Presidents of the Argentine Confederation and of Uruguay. A large steam ram for the Brazilian navy has been sent out from France. Others are nearly completed at Rio Janeiro.

The prospects of the coffee crop were most cheering.

A party of emigrants from Missouri had arrived in Brazil to settle.

There is a report that Juarez intends to abandon Mexico and come to reside in New York, thus giving up the cause as hopeless.

It has been discovered by a secret Inspector of the Government that the Paymasters' department in Missouri is in a bad condition. Paymaster Holt has been arrested upon a charge of fraud.

Since the 1st of July the receipts from Internal revenue have amounted to over \$80,000,000. The receipts on last Tuesday were \$1,815,496.

The War Department has decided that officers tendering their resignations are entitled to the three months' pay proper, the same as allowed officers who are mustered out.

The amount of National Bank notes issued last week was \$3,421,000. There is now \$188,402,870 of that currency out.

A careful scrutiny of the new counterfeit one-hundred dollar note shows that it was printed from the original dies or bold-pieces, which were engraved outside of the Treasury at the commencement of greenback manufacture. The counterfeit is a dangerous one, being almost as good looking as the genuine.

The National Convention of Odd-fellows is now in session in Baltimore. Representatives from all the States are present, together with some from the British provinces.

The loss by fire Wednesday in New York reached three millions of dollars. Nine thousand bales of cotton were destroyed, instead of nine hundred, as stated.

The trial of the alleged steamboat burners began in St. Louis yesterday. The attorney for the prisoners gave notice that he should subpoena Jeff. Davis, Secretaries Mallory and Seddon, and Admirals Farragut and Porter.

At a meeting of Fenians in Jersey City, night before last, one of the speakers stated the Fenian cause was progressing finely, and that already the engravers were engaged in preparing the bonds of the Irish Republic.

The Massachusetts Radical State Convention frankly admits that their intense anxiety for the extension of the right of suffrage to the negroes of the Southern States does not arise altogether from a desire to do good unto them, whom they rather ostentatiously proclaim to be not only men, but their brothers—but that it is due greatly, if not entirely, to a very natural desire which they feel "to keep the jewel Liberty in the family of Freedom,"—that is, to interpret into English, means to keep the Federal Government and its enormous patronage and its vast influence in the hands of the Radicals.

It is designed to have a meeting of the Louisiana Legislature in time, so that the new Senators may arrive in Washington in time for the meeting of Congress.

General Lee is to meet the directors of Washington College to-day, (Wednesday), preparatory to assuming the Presidency of that institution.

The defense of Capt. Wirtz have subpoenaed 112 witnesses.

The St. Albans Bank have received back a part of the money taken from them by the robbers, and recovered by the Canadian authorities.

The trial of Champ Ferguson has concluded, and he is now in close confinement awaiting the promulgation of his sentence.

The Damascus, from Europe, has arrived. She brings no political news of interest. The Queen was expected to return to England, from Germany, on the 8th.

Washington specials states that President Johnson will not permit his reconstruction policy to be discussed in the Cabinet sessions. All he wants of his Secretaries is their opinions upon the details which come under their special supervision.

## Bond and Free—and Free Bonds.

Working men of America—who made the law that you should toil all your life to pay the billions of taxes heaped upon us?

Why should the poor men and women who have given their earnings—their sons—their relatives—their blood to subdue the rebellion now closed, not only pay for all the feast of blood, but support in idleness the loyal cowards who dare not fight, and the rich men who hold constitutional enactments from taxation?—Who made the poor—the laboring man, woman and child slaves to debt?

Why should you pay any man for being rich?

When this war began, Thomas Smith owned a farm. It was a good farm—he sold it for twenty thousand dollars, and put the money in bank. He was a "loyal" man—that is, a man who was in favor of abolitionism.

Of military trials, Of arbitrary arrests, Of false imprisonments,

Of a total disregard for the constitution, for the laws, and for civil rights.

During the reign of Lincoln, the above qualifications were the test of loyalty.—Smith had a contract and made a hundred thousand dollars, half of which he divided among generals, senators and republican lobbyists. When the war was over, Smith had seventy-five thousand dollars. He invested in bonds exempt from taxation, and receives every three months over seven per cent. interest, amounting to five thousand and ninety-seven dollars a year.

Smith is rich—loyal, and a man of means. He wears broadcloth, gets drunk, does as he pleases, and no one dare question him. He has seventy-five thousand dollars in government bonds—he does not have a farthing of tax to pay—his fortune is made.

When this war began, Robert Jones owned a farm worth twenty thousand dollars. He kept it—went to war—fought—returned. He found his farm taxed five thousand dollars by his stay at home neighbors to raise bounty money to give men to exempt them from the draft. He finds his property taxed—taxed—taxed—taxed! to raise money to clear his loyal neighbors from war!

And Robert Jones learns that he cannot sell a cow—horse, crop of grain or hay but it is taxed. He is made to pay taxes on all he has. He must help build roads, bridges, schoolhouses, jails, churches and pay the current expenses of his town, county, city, state and nation. He toils early and late. His wife sells eggs, butter, cheese, poultry and the products of her loom. His children wear coarse goods, sell berries, wild fruit and game from the field, river or forest to help along. The best horse goes in the fall to pay taxes.

Thomas Smith has seventy-five thousand dollars in government bonds, by a republican administration made exempt from taxation. He lives at ease, pays not a cent of taxes for any purpose whatever, and then by law compels Robert Jones to toil to pay taxes, and work five hours extra each week to pay him, Smith, in tax instead of his fortune beside.

Look at this!

We are talking to the Robert Jones of America now—to the laboring men of our country, and not to the bond holders who are by a republican bondocratic administration protected in their wealth.

Democracy made the nation what it was when the war commenced—a rich, happy and prosperous people.

Democracy favored equal taxation—equal responsibility.

Democracy taught law and obedience thereto.

Republicanism has brought us war.

It has filled the earth with dead bodies. It has hillocked the land with graves.

It has transformed a rich and producing country into a land of ashes, broken hearts and desolation.

It has rotted in extravagance and has heaped more taxes upon the people of the United States than was levied upon America, France, England and Spain when the war began.

It has by legislation withdrawn two thirds the capital of the entire United States from taxation by borrowing money and giving the government's notes or bonds for the same, and besides paying double the interest foreign countries pay, exempted the notes or bonds from taxation, thus throwing the entire weight of the war, and its extravagances of the most wicked, reckless, profligate and mischievous working administration, the country ever knew upon the laboring men of the United States.

The curse visited upon Egypt; the curse of lice, frogs, etc., was an evidence of Divine love in comparison with the curse of Republicanism this country is now laboring under.

Working men of America—will you heed those things? Will you consent longer to follow the cloud which has already led you so far from peace and happiness?

Will you endorse and support the power which takes you by the throat—mocks at your prayers—robs you of labor—toys with your liberties—revels in your blood—lives on your earnings and makes of the laboring men muds on which to rear still higher an accursed and oppressive aristocracy?

Let us demand our rights—let us have retrenchments—reform—law—order and economy. Let us have EQUAL TAXATION or EXPIATE THE ENTIRE NATIONAL DEBT.

WE shall never have an honest and economical Government until we reduce the taxes.
