

# Prospectus of the Indiana State Sentinel, Daily and Weekly, for 1865-6.

Armed rebellion has been suppressed, and the conflict of ideas and of principles has succeeded it. The question now presented to the people is whether the Old Government, as framed by the Men of the Revolution, shall be restored, or whether a New Government, ignoring States Rights and obliterating State Lines, with an overshadowing centralized power usurping the control and direction of the domestic policy and institutions of the States, shall succeed it. The *SENTINEL*, as heretofore, will continue to maintain and defend old-fashioned Democratic doctrines. Adopting the creed of JEFFERSON, the founder of the Democratic Party, the *SENTINEL* will advocate—

The support of the State Governments in all their rights, as the most competent administrations for our domestic concerns, and the surest bulwarks against all republican tendencies.  
The preservation of the general government in its whole constitutional vigor, as the sheet anchor of our peace at home and safety abroad.  
A jealous care of the right of election by the people.  
Absolute acquiescence in the will of the majority, the vital principle of Republics, from which is no appeal, but to force, the vital principle and immediate parent of despotism.  
The supremacy of the civil over the military authority.

Economy in the public expenses, that labor may be lightly burdened.  
The honest payment of our debts, and sacred preservation of the public faith.  
Encouragement of agriculture, and of commerce and manufactures.  
The diffusion of information, and arraignment of all abuses at the bar of public reason.  
Freedom of religion, freedom of the press, and freedom of the person under protection of the habeas corpus.  
Trial by jury impartially selected.

Upon the new issues the war has developed and forced upon the consideration of the country, the *SENTINEL* will sustain:

The supremacy of the White race.  
Equal taxation, not exempting any description of property from its equal and just contribution for the support of the Government—general, State, county and municipal.

The immediate restoration of the late rebel States to their former relations to the general Government, "with all the dignity, equality, and rights of the several States unimpaired."  
The constitutional right of the several States to determine the qualification of voters.

The reduction of the public expenditures to the lowest limit consistent with public safety, to maintain the public credit and faith inviolate, and diminish the burdens of the people.

The *SENTINEL* will contain the latest telegraphic news; full and complete market reports, foreign and domestic; faithful reports of legislative and congressional proceedings; State and local news; interesting miscellany, and, in a word, everything that may be necessary to make it valuable to the politician, the business man, to the farmer, the mechanic and laborer, and in all respects an acceptable family paper. Both Congress and the Legislature will soon assemble, and it is important that the people should be correctly advised of their action and of the measures they shall adopt.

Now is the time to read. The newspaper, presenting itself daily and weekly, has a powerful influence in moulding public sentiment. It becomes therefore, the patriotic duty of all who entertain the belief that the only hope of maintaining a free, a pure, and an economical Government is in the supremacy of Democratic principles and policy, to see that papers advocating those doctrines and measures have a general circulation.

The *SENTINEL*, deprived of all official patronage, looks alone to the people for support, and it will ever be found a true advocate to their rights and interests. With liberal encouragement its proprietors will enlarge and otherwise improve it, and place it in a position in every respect worthy the powerful party it represents.
