

Prospectus of the Indiana State Sentinel, Daily and Weekly, for 1865-6.

Armed rebellion has been suppressed, and the conflict of ideas and of principles has succeeded it. The question now presented to the people is whether the Old Government, as framed by the Men of the Revolution, shall be restored, or whether a New Government, ignoring State Rights and obliterating State Lines, with an overshadowing centralized power usurping the control and direction of the domestic policy and institutions of the States, shall succeed it. The SENTINEL, as heretofore, will continue to maintain and defend old fashioned Democratic doctrines. The support of the State Governments in all their domestic concerns, and the surest bulwarks against anti-republican tendencies.

The preservation of the general government in its whole completeness, a rigid and unshaken anchor of our peace at home and a safe broad shield for the freedom of the world.

A jealous care of the right of election by the people.

The supremacy of the civil over the military authority.

Economy in the public expenses, that labor may be lightly burdened.

The honest payment of our debts, and sacred preserve of the public faith.

Encouragement of agriculture, and of commerce amidst hindrance.

The diffusion of information, and arrangement of all business at the bar of public men.

Freedom of religion, freedom of the press, and freedom of the person under protection of the habeas corpus.

Trial by juries impartially selected.

Upon the new issues the war has developed and forced upon the consideration of the country, the SENTINEL will sustain:

The supremacy of the Whiterace.

Equal taxation, not exempting any description of property from its equal and just contribution for the support of the Government—general, State, county and municipal.

The immediate restoration of the late rebel States to their former relations to the General Government, "with all the dignity, equality, and rights of the several States unimpaired."

The constitutional right of the several States to determine the qualification of voters.

The reduction of the public expenditures to the lowest limit consistent with public safety, to maintain the public credit and faith inviolate, and diminish the burdens of the people.

The SENTINEL will contain the latest telegraphic news; full and complete market reports, foreign and domestic; faithful reports of legislative and congressional proceedings; State and local news; interesting miscellany, and, in a word, everything that may be necessary to make it valuable to the politician, to the business man, to the farmer, the mechanic and laborer, and in all respects an acceptable family paper. Both Congress and the Legislature will soon assemble, and it is important that the people should be correctly advised of their action and of the measures they shall adopt.

Now is the time to read. The newspaper, presenting itself daily and weekly, has a powerful influence in moulding public sentiment. It becomes therefore, the patriotic duty of all who entertain the belief that the only hope of maintaining a free, a pure, and an economical Government is in the supremacy of Democratic principles and policy, to see that papers advocating those doctrines and measures have a general circulation.
