AN ORDINANCE,

Prohibiting persons from interfering with the Marshal in the discharge of his duties.

Sec. 1. It is ordained by the Mayor, and

Commission Council of the City of Crawfordsville,

that no person who shall interfere with the Marshal in the discharge of his duties, or shall oppose him in the execution of his commands when called upon by said Marshal to assist him in the discharge of his official duties, shall be subject to a fine of any sum not exceeding fifty dollars.

Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect, and be in force from and after its date and legal publication.
