The News Condenser.

Gold closed in New York yesterday at 1483.

Juarez intends to establish his Government at Chihuahua.

Ex-Governor Aiken has been elected to Congress from Charleston.

Libby Prison and Castle Thunder are to be transformed into storehouses.

The Tennessee Legislature will adjourn from December 10 to January 8.

There are only eleven persons confined in the Old Capital Prison at the present time.

The question of an increase of the regular army will be a prominent one before the next Congress.

It is supposed that Governor Marvin will be elected to the United States Senate from Florida.

A battalion of regular troops arrived at Richmond on Monday and will be assigned to duty there.

It is reported that Humphrey Marshall is negotiating for the purchase of the *National Intelligencer*.

By the sinking of the Niagara, near Helena, 150 negro soldiers and deck hands and freemen were drowned.

The Mississippi Legislature adopted a bill permitting negro testimony in all cases except where whites only are interested.

General Mejia has ordered the Matamoras Ranchero to stop publishing articles insulting to citizens of the United States.

Of ten thousand negroes brought down Cape Fear river in March last, two thousand died in less than three months for the want of medical attendance.

An entire family, consisting of Mr. Daniel Walrath, his wife, and a daughter twelve years of age, were murdered in Herkimer county, New York, on Monday night. Mr. W. was shot through the head, Mrs. W.'s head was mashed in, and the child's throat was cut.

The entire number of Indians inhabiting all parts of our country amounts to about 418,000. The estimated number in the unexplored Territories is 30,000; in Texas, 24,100; of the tribes living in New Mexico, 92,130; in California, 32,231; in Oregon, 22,733, and in Utah 11,500.

A battle took place on the 17th inst., in the Northern part of Nevada, between Lieut. Connor, with sixty California Volunteers and a howitzer, and a large band of Indians who had fortified themselves in Black Mountain. During the engagement one of the volunteers was killed and two wounded, while 120 of the Indians were killed, but few escaping. All their horses, arms and ammunition were captured.

It is said that no part of the President's Message is being prepared with as much care as that portion relating to Mexico. His position is understood to be that no interference upon our part will be necessary.

It is thought that the court of inquiry are now satisfied that Commander Craven of the Niagara did right in declining a contest with the ram Stonewall.

The statement that the Government had detailed a national vessel to assist in laying the cable at Behring's Straits is untrue.

It is untrue that the President has pardoned John Mitchell. The latter, however, took the oath of allegiance.

An ingenious smuggling scheme has been detected on the Canada border. There were thirty-four women on a railway car, who had what appeared to be babies carefully wrapped up, with the feet exposed to observation. It turned out that they were tin cases, fashioned after the form of babies, and each containing from three to five gallons of whisky. The women were arrested.

The report that there has been a case of cholera in New York is contradicted by Doctor Sayres.

Messrs. Belmont & Co., as agents for the Rothschilds, have put in a claim for the tobacco seized by the Treasury Department at Richmond, as rebel property. The case will come up in court.

The President has issued an order releasing from Fort Pulaski the rebel Secretary of War, Seddon, and Judge Magrath, of South Carolina.

The contractor at Ford's Theatre has finish-

ed his \$28,000 job, and has turned it over to the Government as a building to contain rebel relics.

A gang of roughs at Astoria, near New York, while engaged in pillaging the citizens, were set upon by a squad of New York police and dispersed. Nearly all the roughs had their skulls cracked by the maces of the police.

The health officers of New York have decided to let all persons on the infected vessel Atlanta, who show no signs of cholera, and who want to come West, to leave the vessel.

The New Yorkers have arranged to pay off a mortgage of \$30,000 on the house recently purchased by General Grant in Washington.

A disturbance has taken place in New Jersey politics. The Republicans propose to unseat Hon. John P. Stockton, who was declared elected United States Senator from New Jersey last winter.

We have advices of infamous outrages by negroes near Savannah. The participants are all to be tried by a military court-martial.

The services of all the workmen in the Brooklyn navy-yard are to be dispensed with. During the past five days a total of five thousand two hundred and sixty-two European immigrants have arrived at New York, on board of nineteen vessels.

It is hinted that Secretary McCulloch will recommend a steady funding of the floating debt with regular withdrawal of greenbacks, which must cause a contraction of the National Bank circulation.

There is trouble on the La Crosse Railroad. The farm mortgagors threaten to destroy the whole road. They have already burned one bridge and torn up a part of the track.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Wears the Best—Her Telegraphic Operator Whips the Greenastle Operator.

The gentlemanly operator who officiates at the office of the Chicago & Louisville Railroad at this place, was drawn, on last Thursday, into a quarrel with the operator in the Greenastle office, a small town south of our city.

The war of words, which was carried on with their respective batteries opened fierce, until finally a center shot from the Crawfordsville battery flashed with a hissing fury the word, *tar—full* in the face of the Greenastle operator. This was too much for flesh and blood to endure. Greenastle saw plainly that he was getting the worst of it at long range, that the battery of his adversary was altogether too heavy for his own, and he resolved to "set his life upon a cast, and stand the hazard of the die," by making one grand charge on the lines of his foe. The distance to traverse to reach the outer works of his enemy was full thirty miles, which with the assistance of a fast train he soon accomplished. Reaching the depot at this place he surprised his enemy, carrying away in his furious charge one small box-stove, five lengths of pipe, demolishing a line of abatis and palisades and almost reaching the battery of his adversary, when a vigorous delivery from the right of the Crawfordsville operator checked his further advance.

The tide was now changed, and in a brief period Greenastle was fleeing in full retreat with his left eye badly gouged, the right peerer adorned with a small mouse and the mud tinted with crimson and scarlet bushes on a velvet back ground. So utterly demoralized had he become that he jumped on a passing train which quickly carried him out of danger.

Daniel Webster If Living Would Have Been a Democrat.

The Hon. George Ticknor Curtis made a speech in Brooklyn on the evening of the 31st instant, from which we make this striking extract:

In all the early part of my life I was a political follower of Daniel Webster. The school in which he trained the young men who came under his influence and readily gave themselves to his teachings, was entirely inconsistent with any sympathy or co-operation in any sectional party. He was a man of great influence and popularity, and the administration of justice into one's own hands. Still, if there is, under a special order of Providence, to be a personal collision between Sol. Meredith and George W. Julian, and our feelings were consulted, we should prefer to have it eventually decided by the spirit of this eventuated. We know nothing about the merits of the dispute; but that Mr. Julian is entitled to a flogging on general principles whenever he encounters an honest man, is a thing we could very readily believe to be true. From what we know of the character of General Meredith, we suspect that he would hardly undertake a thing of this kind without what he considered extreme provocation; and if the manners of his antagonist are to be judged by the spirit and temper of his late speech in Indianapolis—which he was not invited by the Legislature to deliver—it is hardly to be wondered that any dispute in which he was engaged should lead to a collision.—*Cin. Enquirer.*
