The News Condenser.

There were seven deaths in Cincinnati last week from suicide.
Mexican advices confirm the death of Ex-Governor Allen, of Louisiana.
The remains of Preston King, who committed suicide by drowning himself, at New York, last November, have been recovered.
An order has been given to at once muster out of service all volunteer surgeons whose services can possibly be dispensed with.
The President has signed the amended habeas corpus act, which is intended to protect military and civil officers from prosecution for outrages done in the discharge of their duty under the infamous Lincoln dynasty.
As was anticipated, the Senate finally passed the Postal Appropriation bill, without the amendment to restrict the President's power of removal without cause. An attempt will be made at once to pass Senator Henderson's bill to accomplish the same object.
A dispatch from Fort Monroe says Jeff. Davis received the announcement of his indictment with great indifference. His main point of defense will be based upon the prerogatives granted every citizen to sustain the official of his respective State.
Lieutenant General Grant has instructed military department commanders to abolish the districts under their command as rapidly as circumstances will permit. In some cases he has recommended the conversion of the district into a military post. Every means which may, consistently with the welfare of the country, be used to reduce the number of volunteers yet in service has been adopted.

The Indianapolis, Crawfordsville & Danville Railroad.

Col. S. C. Willson, President of the I. C. & D. R. R., and Maj. Elston, one of the Directors, returned home from Cincinnati on last Thursday night. They obtained from Mr. H. C. Lord, President of the Indianapolis & Cincinnati Railroad, an assignment of all the donations heretofore made and the right of way which are now in possession of the new company. The rapid and successful manner in which Col. Willson and the Board of Directors have pushed this great enterprise since the formation of the new organization, gives assurance, that before many days work will again be resumed along the entire line.

OBITUARY.

ABRAHAM K. MILLER whose death occurred on Wednesday the 2d of May, 1866, was one of the veritable pioneers of the Great West. He was a steadfast Democrat through life and loved and honored Andrew Jackson. In his younger days he was deprived of the advantages of an education, yet he was a self made man and understood thoroughly the principles of a republican government and the political history of his country. In early days he was a great hunter and loved his rifle and hounds passionately. He was a man of powerful strength and constitution—a good husband and father—a hard working man he felled the forest before him. He was proverbially honest and benevolent and withal religious, yet his religion was not sectarian but composite. He was born in Virginia, October 12th, 1784, where he lived in his father's house until he was eight years old when he removed with his parents to Kentucky. On obtaining his majority he married Miss ELIZABETH ENDICOTT, January 17, 1809, and so became husband and father. He lived to number eighty-one years, six months and twenty days, and departed this life May 2d, 1866.
