

Wholesale Republican Advice.
Mr. Patrick Agan, of Syracuse, N. Y., a member of the Republican party, in high standing, and for years an editor of an influential daily, thus expresses himself of the political sense of the majority of Congress, and what he believes to be the duty of every patriot. He says:

"I observe that the friends of President Johnson's restoration policy are to hold a National Convention on the 14th proximo at Philadelphia, for the purpose of taking steps for securing the adoption of that platform by the nation. Will you permit me to say that I am rejoiced to note this movement, and to express the hope that our Republican friends in all parts of the country will unite in it and give it direction? It was time, in my judgment, for this step to be taken. There is a party in Congress bound to commit the Republican party against this policy, and thus sectionalize and destroy an organization, and it is the duty of every Republican to aid in resisting and defeating this unpatriotic endeavor. The President's policy is the only one that can stand the test, and must be sustained and carried out to the end. We have had enough of war; the cause of the bloody struggle is removed; there remains no longer any cause of alienation between the sections; let us now have peace and reunion; let the North and South join hands in a common effort to restore fraternal relations, and let tranquility reign over a country acknowledging a common language, a common flag and a common allegiance."

That is good advice, sensible advice, patriotic advice, but the misfortune is, that the Congressional hill contains too many small potato politicians for such advice to be heeded. It is like sowing seed in barren ground. They know how by trickery to advance their own wages, add to the burdens of others, and legislate in the vain attempt to pull the white man down to the level of the black, but beyond that, for broad comprehensive views of public policy, they are utterly unfit. We have specimens of such hereabouts.

To Discharged Soldiers.

By the late law containing Bounties, an Additional Bounty of \$100 is granted to each and every soldier enlisted for three years, and served out his time, who has been discharged, or entitled to receive no more than the \$100 bounty heretofore allowed by law; and any soldier who has been discharged before the expiration of his term of service, on account of wounds received, or this duty is entitled to an Additional Bounty of \$100.

An Additional Bounty of \$50 is now allowed to each soldier enlisted for two years, who has received, or is entitled to receive, no more than \$50 bounty under previous laws.

Parties now allowed to each and every soldier enlisted for any less period than two years, who has been honorably discharged on account of wounds received in the line of duty.

To the Heirs of Deceased Soldiers.

If a soldier, enlisted for three years, as above stated, has died of wounds received, or disease contracted in the line of duty, the Additional Bounty of \$100 is allowed to the widow, minor child, or parents of such deceased soldier in the order named.

If a soldier, enlisted for any less period than three years, has died of wounds received, or disease contracted in the line of duty, the Additional Bounty of \$50 is allowed to the widow, minor child, or parents of such deceased soldier in the order named.

To Officers.

All officers below the rank of Brigadier General who were in the service as such on the 3d of March, 1865, and who were honorably discharged, or who have received a pension, are now entitled to three months pay per year.

To Pensioners.

Widows are now entitled by law to an increase of their pension \$2 per month for each child under 16 years of age.

Invalid soldiers, for total disability, are entitled to a pension of from eight, to fifteen, twenty and twenty-five dollars per month.

To obtain the benefits of these laws, persons in all cases to make a new application.

Applicants for the Additional Bounty must bring with them a certificate of discharge, or receipt for the same.

Every Commissioned officer below the rank of Brigadier General, who was in the service March 3d, 1865, or on account of disability, are entitled to \$100 bounty, enlisted for a less period \$50 bounty.

Widows of deceased soldier entitled to an increase of pension of \$2 per month for each child under 16 years of age.

NOTICE is hereby given to the citizens of Union Township, Montgomery county, State of Indiana, that I, Benjamin F. Hays, a white male inhabitant of the county of Montgomery, in the State of Indiana, of the age of twenty-one years, will apply to the Board of Commissioners of Montgomery county, State of Indiana, at their next regular session, commencing on the first Monday in September, A. D. 1866, for a license to retail intoxicating liquors in a less quantity than a quart at a time, under the Temperance Law of 1859, for the term of one year.
