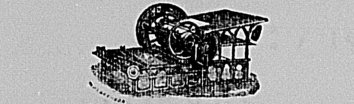

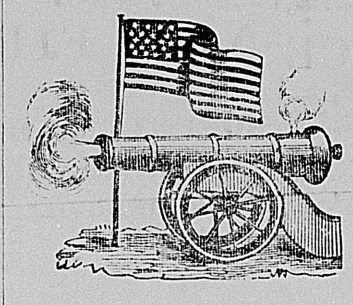
A Card.
