THE COUNTY FAIR.—The Annual Fair of the Montgomery County Agricultural Society commences on the 4th of October. From the extensive preparations which are being made, we are of opinion that this will be the most attractive ever held in this County. We are glad to observe that an unusual degree of interest is being taken in this institution by the people. This fact itself indicates the growing prosperity of our country.

IT is necessary, in order to make "Fair Week" what it ought to be, and to make it produce the good results which it might produce, that all our citizens should exert themselves. Let the gentlemen of the city, the professional man, the artisan and the laborer join with the farming classes in the effort to make Montgomery County Fair one of the Institutions of the State. Situated as we are with our immense agricultural and mineral resources, with a reputation of being the best stock-producing county in the State, and with the splendid railroad facilities we are almost in possession of, this County Fair can be made an affair to be looked forward to, as to a week of solid enjoyment for people of every occupation in life. There are perhaps but three professions or occupations which can not enter into competition for a premium. The minister may not be able to exhibit his particular path to eternal bliss and take a red ribbon "on it;" no prize perhaps may be offered to the shrewd attorney for the display of the "clearest client's pocket book;" and the surgeon perhaps will not be called upon to exhibit his skill in cutting, carving and burning. 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## COUNTY FAIR NOTICE.

Persons wishing to make Entries, or to select stalls for registry, any time prior to the Fair of the Montgomery County Agricultural Society, can find the undersigned at the office of the Township Trustee, in Crawfordsville.

A difference of opinion in regard to the ruling out of animals or articles that have taken 1st Premiums for 2 years consecutively, having been reported, it is thought necessary to make an explanation to prevent misconception.

Any annual or article can be admitted to contend for a Premium that has not taken the RED RIBBON in succession for the same time.

That is: A stallion for General Purposes, or Light Harness, has taken the 1st Premium two years successively for General Purposes or Light Harness, can not be admitted to contend in the same ring again. Nor can a Broad Mare, nor a Jack, having taken premiums 2 years as aforesaid, be offered as best Broad Mare, or best Jack, for it is the same thing they have been awarded premiums for, before, but a colt for instance, that has taken a 1st Premium as a year old, and the next year as a 2 year old, can come in this year as 3 years old, for it is not the same thing. Nor does it prohibit a Mare or Gelding, that has taken the red ribbon twice successively, as the best Mare or Gelding of 2 years old and over, from coming in on the Time Track, or under the saddle, if they have the speed or qualities, provided they have not won the ribbons in these rings before in the manner prohibited, for these are different things.
