The Ohio and Pennsylvania Elections.

The election in these States, on last

Tuesday, has probably resulted in the

success of the radical ticket by small

majorities. The Democracy have

made noble fight, and although de-

feated, they have everything to en-

courage them to renewed action.

The result of the state elections in

Pennsylvania and Ohio is an elector-

ation so very nearly equal that

there is even yet doubt as to which

party has triumphed. In Pennsylvania,

the radical candidate for judge of the

supreme court is unquestionably

elected, and the appearances to

Democrat.

Whether Mr. Pendleton or Mr.

Hays is elected Governor of Ohio is

not exceed a few hundred either way.

markable. The total number of votes

in the two states is upward of a mil-

lion. So equal a division in a popular

body so vast is an event that has rare-

ly ever been witnessed in this country.

party is dead.
