Denunciation of the Infamous Georgia Bill and other Infamous Legislation by Gen. Farnsworth, one of the leading Radicals of Congress.

The debate on the Georgia Bill was resumed.

Mr. Farnsworth continued his argument against the bill. He contradicted the statement made yesterday by Mr. Butler, that only two members from Georgia had been admitted to the House last Congress, and these through a mistake. The fact being that six members out of seven were even admitted. In a criticism of the theory that the government of Georgia was only provisional, he called attention to the fact that Governor Bullock, of Georgia, had not been signing his self provisional Governor of Georgia, but Governor of Georgia, that his messages to the Legislature were not addressed to the provisional Legislature, but to the Legislature of Georgia; and that the test oath which all officers of provisional governments were required to take had not been taken by the officers of the existing State Government; besides, he also wanted to know whether a provisional government could ratify an amendment to the Constitution of the United States? and what became of the ratification of the fourteenth amendment by the Legislature of Georgia if the theory was correct that the Legislature was only provisional and illegal.

Mr. Lawrence replied that a provisional Legislature was just as lawful and regular and had the same power within the scope of its authority as any other Legislature.

Mr. Farnsworth remarked that according to this bill the Georgia Legislature was not only provisional, but was illegal, and the logic of the bill, as well as the speech of Mr. Butler yesterday, was that everything done by that Legislature was that the election of United States Senators, was illegal, and therefore its ratification of the fourteenth amendment was also illegal. Why not as well declare that Bullock shall be Governor of Georgia for six years or for life? Why it was monstrous, and more monstrous still in fact, in the eyes of a few that the same Governor was charged by the State Treasurer with stealing and appropriating money of the State. The only excuse for the bill was that it passed, the Republican party would lose the next election in Georgia. He was afraid they would also lose the next election in New York.

Mr. Stevenson of Ohio—How low would you go?

Mr. Farnsworth, ironically—Why, of course, pass a law installing Republican officers there and providing their tenure of office shall be for life. There is an easier way of maintaining our ascendancy in the nation than by holding elections. That way is by acts of Congress. That is the way to do it. The gentleman from Massachusetts (Butler) had yesterday raise the cry of murder in the House. Whenever he wanted to pass one of his reconstruction bills, he got up and cried murder, murder, and by a clever fellow, whenever out of the bills was to be passed the Washington Chronicle published an account of some great outrage, and immediately the Reconstruction Committee was called together and a bill reported to the House. He remembered that last year, a gentleman, a very clever fellow, but a man whose politics was always those of the reigning dynasty, who had sold arms to the people of Georgia in the winter of 1860 and 1861 with which to shoot down Union soldiers, went to Georgia, and with the assistance of Governor Bullock, manipulated the Legislature and got a committee appointed to examine his claim for payment for these arms. The committee was manipulated so as to make a favorable report, but the Legislature refused to adopt or pay the claim. Thereupon this man came to Washington, full of sorrow, his heart wrung to its deepest depths, with tears in his eyes, over the troubles of the negro and loyal men of Georgia. That man was in favor of the reconstruction of Georgia at once. What was his touchstone? It was that he could get his \$25,000, and interest, for the arms he had sold to the State of Georgia. Mr. (Farnsworth) felt that the passage of the bill prolonging the terms of office of the men who now control the State, authorizing Governor Bullock to commence de novo, and putting the power of the State into his hands, would be a most infernal outrage on the tax payers of that State. He believed the bill was in the interest of the people who desired to perpetuate their reign so they might put money in their purse.

Supreme Court of Indiana—Important Decision Affecting Donations by Counties to Railroad Companies.

One of the decisions rendered by the Supreme Court on Saturday last, that of Harvey vs. Indianapolis, Crawfordsville and Danville Railroad Company, is a highly important one. Some two years since the County Commissioners of Montgomery, finding that a large surplus was held by the County Treasurer, made a donation of \$125,000 to the railroad company. This was provided, should be deposited by the company in Elston's Bank to be drawn out and paid as the work should be done. A warrant was drawn by the Auditor upon the Treasurer for \$50,000 and this, with the balance, or nearly all of it, in the form of bonds and mortgages, was deposited as provided for by the order of the Commissioners, and the transaction was completed. The appellant brought suit in the Circuit Court for an injunction, but a demurser to the complaint was sustained. The Supreme Court reverse the case, on the ground that the Commissioners had no authority to make the donation, and that the whole transaction was unauthorized by law. It was claimed by the company that the order was properly made in the first place, the money being in the Treasury, and no tax being levied for this special purpose, it being for a good object; and, furthermore, that, having been executed, an injunction would not reach the case. The Supreme Court holds differently, and also that any tax payer, however small his interest may be, has the authority to bring the suit. It may also be brought directly in the court of the county, and not in the form of an appeal from the Commissioners. This decision leaves the matter in a decidedly unpleasant shape for several parties.

An interesting Expose—How Julian was elected to Congress in the Fourth Indiana District—Affidavit of one of the Radical Judges of the Richmond South Poll.

It will be recollect that there was a close vote at the election in October, 1868, in the Fourth congressional district in this State, between Reed and Julian, and that the election is now being contested by Reed. Julian obtained a nominal majority by throwing out one of the polls at Richmond, and the ground of irregularity; and he also charged that the ballot box had been stuffed, although it was in charge of two strong republican judges. This is contested with all their other securities. The Hartford, (Conn.) Post, (Rep.) thus expresses the general wish in regard to this abominable tax:
