Some one said there was a big supper at R. B. Snyder's last Sunday night. It must be a mistake, for I failed to see any of the wedding cake on my table.

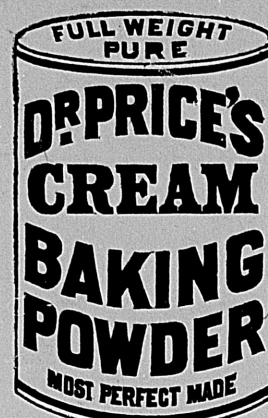
Johnnie Singer has a novel way of hauling off his stock. One wagon tied behind the other with a hog in one and a calf in the other. There are no flies on Johnnie.
