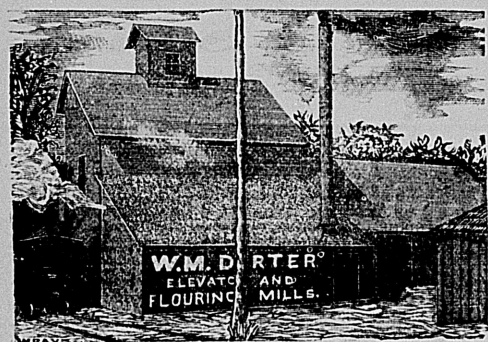

MORE FIGURES.

Further Returns from the Elections of Tuesday.

ESTIMATES OF THE NEXT CONGRESS.

Republicans Likely to Have But a Narrow Majority in the Senate—Reports from the Count of Votes in the States.

THE NEW CONGRESS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The Tribune says: The Democratic landslide has had an appreciable effect upon the political complexion of the United States Senate. That body in the Fifty-second Congress will have 88 members. The Republicans had calculated that it would stand 51 to 37 in their favor. Tuesday's election, however, disappointed them in Illinois, Kansas, New York, New Hampshire, North Dakota and Wisconsin. The Legislature in some of these States is doubtful, and others are certainly Democratic. In the light of the latest returns the Senate will probably stand as follows: Republicans, 45; Democrats, 39; Farmers' Alliance, 1 (from Kansas); doubtful, 3.

The returns coming in of the vote for members of the Lower House continue to show gains for the Democrats and the Farmers' Alliance. The relative strength of the parties in the House will probably be as follows: Democrats, 224; Republicans, 91; Farmers' Alliance Democrats, 13; Farmers' Alliance, 3.

ILLINOIS.

The returns from the State of Illinois have become sufficiently complete to announce decisively the result of the State ticket. The Democrats have won, and Edwin S. Wilson, of Olney, is elected State Treasurer by 11,888 and Henry Raab, of Belleville, Superintendent of Public Instruction by 36,940.

No compilations have been made on the trusteeship of the University of Illinois, but the indications are that the three Democratic nominees have also been elected by a slight majority. The exact vote will not be ascertained until the returns have been canvassed and sent to the Secretary of State at Springfield. But the complete returns leave no doubt that the result is as herein stated and that the entire Democratic State ticket is elected. The returns which furnish this result are official from all the counties in the State except seven. These have been carefully estimated, and as they have heretofore generally given Democratic majorities there can be no doubt that the vote herewith announced is substantially correct.

Returns show that in addition to Democratic gains heretofore announced in their Congressional districts Congressmen Payson and Hill have also been defeated and Snow and Stewart, Democrats, elected. In response to a request for information both Congressmen Hill and Payson have telegraphed the Associated Press conceding their defeat, the former by 650 and the latter by 500 to 700. This makes the Congressional delegation from Illinois stand 14 Democrats and 6 Republicans. The Congressmen elected are as follows:

First district, Abner Taylor, Rep.; Second, Lawrence E. McGann, Dem.; Third, Allen E. Durbin, Dem.; Fourth, Walter C. Newberry, Dem.; Fifth, Albert J. Hopkins, Rep.; Sixth, Robert R. Hill, Rep.; Seventh, Thomas J. Henderson, Rep.; Eighth, Lewis Steward, Dem.; Ninth, H. W. Snow, Dem.; Tenth, Philip S. Post, Rep.; Eleventh, Benjamin T. Cable, Dem.; Twelfth, Scott Wike, Dem.; Thirteenth, William M. Springer, Dem.; Fourteenth, Owen Scott, Dem.; Fifteenth, S. T. Busey, Dem.; Sixteenth, George T. Fithian, Dem.; Seventeenth, Edward Lane, Dem.; Eighteenth, William S. Forman, Dem.; Nineteenth, James R. Williams, Dem.; Twentieth, George W. Smith, Rep.

The Democrats will have 100 votes in the Thirty-seventh General Assembly, the Republicans 101 and the F. M. B. A. 3. The Senate will stand as follows: Republicans, 27; Democrats, 24. The House make-up will be: Democrats, 76; Republicans, 74; F. M. B. A. 3. The total vote of the State is 673,903 for State Treasurer and only 271 votes more for Superintendent of Public Instruction. In 1888 the total vote for President was 747,676. The falling off is 73,768, or less than 10 per cent.

The Prohibition vote was over 20,000, or almost as much as in 1888, when General Fisk polled 21,695.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—As a result of the election Tuesday Chicago gains an additional population of nearly 5,000, and its territory is still further extended three miles to the west at the southern end. This was attained by the vote in favor of the annexation to the city of the towns of Washington Heights and West Roseland. Fernwood, with a population of about 3,000, voted against annexation.

WISCONSIN.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 8.—Official returns from the Eighteenth district show the election of Clinton Babbitt, Dem., over H. A. Cooper, Rep. This leaves only one Republican Congressman in Wisconsin, Haugen in the Eighth district, who has about 1,000 majority. Bailey, the Democratic candidate, threatens to make a contest. The Republicans suffer a net loss of 6 Congressmen, besides the Legislature, which will probably elect ex-Secretary Vilas to succeed Senator Spooner, although other candidates are springing up. Peck, for Governor, has a majority of 30,000.

INDIANA.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 8.—Official returns from the State at large are just beginning to come in. The Democratic majority will be about 18,000. The only Republicans elected to Congress are Waugh in the Sixth and Johnson in the Ninth. The Legislature is Democratic in both houses, and the Democrats have 69 majority in joint session. In Marion County the entire Democratic ticket is elected by majorities ranging from 1,782 to 4,602.

MICHIGAN.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 8.—Even now there is considerable doubt as to the State Senate and the Congressmen in the Eighth, Ninth and Eleventh districts. The House is Democratic by a good majority. From returns in up to the present time the Eighth gives the Democratic candidate a majority of 44
