**The Corey-Wilson Fight.**  
About 25 of the boys of this city went to La-  
fayette last Friday night to witness the fight

to stop his man in eight rounds. Ol. Gill was  
referee, Grimes, of Lafayette, seconded Wil-  
son, and Howard Dickerson, of this city, was  
behind Corey. The theater was packed from  
pit to dome and at 8 o'clock the principals  
appeared upon the stage and retired to their  
corners. Corey was the heavier man of the  
two and looked every inch a fighter. Wilson,  
who is an old campaigner, made a very  
good appearance, but as soon as the fight be-  
gan it was plainly seen that the man was  
overmatched. Corey played with him as a  
cat would a mouse, and could have finished  
him in the first round had he not been disposed  
to give the audience some sport for their  
money. Following is the fight by rounds:

First Round.—After some light sparring  
Corey landed on Wilson's head, knocking him  
down. Wilson rose at once and after sparring  
a minute was knocked violently against the  
ropes and time was called.

Second Round.—Wilson came up weak and  
groggy. He gained first blood, however, his  
elbow coming in contact with Corey's fore-  
head. Cory then knocked him down and Wil-  
son rising clinched and tried to throw Cory.  
The latter got a good hold, however, and  
threw the weakened man nearly up to the  
ceiling.

Third Round.—Wilson was about gone and  
was quickly knocked to the floor three times,  
his second on the last blow throwing up the  
sponge.

## STATE NEWS.

**Bits of Information of Especial In-  
terest to Indians.**

**Chinese Freemasons to Meet.**  
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 29.—  
Chinese Freemasons from all parts  
of Indiana and National officers  
from San Francisco are in the  
city to attend the State convention,  
which meets to-day. Mang Du, chief  
master and bishop; D. Thomas (Chee  
Kung Tong), presiding elder, and Ah  
Hee, secretary of all San Francisco, are  
here. Delegates are present from Vin-  
cent, Terre Haute, Seymour and New  
Albany. Many candidates for degrees  
are expected. D. Thomas (Chee Kung  
Tong), one of the National officers, an  
intelligent Chinaman, says that an er-  
roneous impression has been created by  
certain reports that Masonry is antag-  
onistic to Chinese Christianity. He says  
Chinese Masonry is identical with Free-  
masonry the world over; that its ad-  
herents help one another, relieve the  
sick and distressed, and are in  
return able to obtain help in any coun-  
try. He says that he, too, is a Chris-  
tian, but that for practical good to  
Chinamen Masonry has an advantage  
over Christianity in that it is univers-  
ally recognized, while the Chinaman who  
embraces Christianity in this country is  
almost forced to give it up when he  
goes back home, but that he can adhere  
to Masonry and practice its tenets with  
impunity there as here.

**Kuhn's Punishment Certain.**

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Dec. 29.—Prose-  
cuting Attorney Robinson and Sheriff  
Viberg, of this city, have re-  
turned from Tiffin, where they  
went to ascertain what chance there is  
of fastening upon Mervin  
Kuhns, the Noble County desperado,  
the murder of Cam-  
pau, the man  
found dead at  
Fostoria, O., on  
the night of No-  
vember 17. Sufficient evidence was de-  
veloped to convict Kuhns of the crime,  
and he will be turned over to the  
Buckeye authorities upon the ar-  
rival of a requisition from the Governor  
of Ohio. Should Kuhns by any means  
escape justice in Ohio he will be  
brought back to Indiana and prosecuted  
for his numerous crimes in this State.

**Fire at Decatur.**

DECATUR, Ind., Dec. 29.—This city  
was visited by fire Friday night. Three  
frame business rooms on South Second  
street, opposite the court-house square,  
were burned. The fire is supposed to  
have originated from a defective flue.  
The stocks burned were valued as fol-  
lows: M. Colchin, bakery and groceries,  
\$1,600; insured in the Hamburg of Ger-  
many for \$900. Alexander Lebrun, meat-  
market, \$400; insured in the "Traders"  
Insurance Company of Chicago for  
\$150. J. D. Hale & Co., feed store, \$1,000;  
no insurance. One of the rooms was  
owned by Mrs. Frances Flagg, whose  
estimated loss is \$800; insured in the  
Fire & Marine Insurance Company of  
New York for \$100. The other two  
rooms were owned by Norval Black-  
burn, publisher of the Decatur Demo-  
crat; estimated loss, \$1,200; insured in  
the Indiana Insurance Company of In-  
dianapolis for \$800.

**Car-Driver Seelye Commended.**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 29.—Hun-  
dreds have visited the morgue to  
look upon the victim of Car-Driver Seelye's  
shot. Saturday afternoon he was  
identified as Alexander Cronin, a Louis-  
ville crook, whose parents re-  
side in St. Louis. He has served  
one term in the Kentucky peni-  
tentiary and two terms in this  
State for highway robbery. Seelye  
appeared in court Saturday, and all  
charges against him were dismissed.  
As his revolver was handed back to him  
Police Superintendent Travis told him  
he had done a good act and to do it  
again under similar circumstances. Tim  
Sullivan was arrested as Cronin's ac-  
complice in the attempted robbery, but  
Seelye failed to identify him.

**To Shut Off the Natural Gas.**

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Dec. 29.—An  
order has been issued to every man-  
ufacturer in this city and all others  
using natural gas to heat their boilers  
to secure other fuel, as on January 1  
their supply of natural gas will be shut  
off. This is done to protect private con-  
sumers during the severe winter  
weather, when it is feared the large  
main pipes will not be sufficient to  
carry the supply required.

**Fatal Accident at Shoals, Ind.**

MITCHELL, Ind., Dec. 29.—While a  
bridge gang of the Ohio & Mississippi  
road was putting in a new bridge at  
Shoals Sunday morning some of the  
timbers gave way, killing Theodore  
Wiseman instantly and injuring four  
men named Long, Little, Jackson and  
Swartz. Long is seriously hurt, his leg  
and arm both being broken.

**Shot Clear Through the Body.**


JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., Dec. 29.—Fri-
