### Coppage Caught.

Glen Coppage, age 19, of Crawfordville, was arrested here yesterday on the strength of a telegram from Marshal Brothers of the Hoosier Anthens. Coppage was wanted to answer the charge of burglarizing Ross Bros' jewelry and notion store, in Crawfordville, Friday night. He was found at Wise's Fifth street variety theatre, and was taken in custody by Officer John Beecher. His valise found at the Bramble house, contained jewelry, knives, razors, etc. He had also in his possession a kodak photographic machine. Though only about the city three hours before arrest, the young man had put in pawn several articles, but all were recovered. He claimed that a Chicago crook had done the robbing job and he (Coppage) was only accessory in sharing the booty—but he must have received the lion's share, judging from the amount of goods he was carrying. Tom Ross, one of the proprietors of the store pillaged, arrived here yesterday afternoon and himself took charge of the prisoner, the pair, captor and captured, handcuffed together, leaving at 5:24 p. m., via the Big Four, for Crawfordville. Coppage is the son of a prominent Crawfordville attorney, and it is difficult to say, owing to lack of acquaintance, who he is a good young man gone wrong or a bad young man found out.—Lafayette Times.

Young Coppage seems to have entered upon a wild career some time since, and is at last headed off before going farther, although bringing disgrace upon indulgent parents and himself. The goods found upon his person were identified by the firm from which they were taken, and Coppage seems to have an excellent chance of serving a term in the penitentiary.

### Badly Burned.

Last week Mrs. Barry Simison left her daughter, Miss Cora, a miss of 13 summers, in charge of two small children, while she went to Jacob Miller's, about three miles away on an errand. She told the girl to begin preparations for supper about half past five, as she would be back soon after that time. Before leaving Mrs. Simison placed coal in the cook stove so that the fire would not go entirely out. It is not known how soon, but shortly after she left, Miss Cora got a small can in which coal oil was kept to kindle cob fires and poured the contents over the smouldering coal and stood leaning over the stove watching it when all at once there was a frightful explosion, the full force striking the girl squarely in the face, burning her eyebrows and eyelashes completely off, setting her hair and bonnet on fire and burning the whole face in a horrible manner, even her tongue and the roof of her mouth were burned. The force of the explosion blew out the caps in the chimney in different rooms and blew soot into every room about the house. The fire was blazing out of every crevice in the stove, and although burned in a shocking manner the heroic girl got water and dashed on the fire, least the house would burn down. Her father was in the field close by, but the girl did not call for help or even send her little four-year-old sister to warn her father of her condition, but set about cleaning up the house. Mr. Simison finally came to the house and was horrified to find his child in so shocking condition. All the assistance possible was rendered but the child will carry bad scars all her life.—New Richmond Enterprise.

After the ball was over Roland packed his grip and told the festive Annie she could paddle her own canoe. The separation weighed heavily on Mrs. Kyle's mind and after making several ineffectual efforts to win her husband back she determined to quit this vale of tears.
