

A Murderer Insane.
COLUMBUS, Ind., July 6.—Ralph Drake on the evening of June 1 in a lodging house in this city murdered Mrs. Ida Ward, wife of John Ward, a farmer from whom he had enticed her. He has since been confined in the county jail in default of \$1,000 bond. He was yesterday adjudged insane and proper papers made out for his commitment to the central asylum at Indianapolis. He has of late been suffering intensely from the effects of the pistol ball which he fired into his head after he had killed his mistress. It is believed that he will live but a short time.

Shot by a Jealous Preacher.
RICHMOND, Ind., July 6.—A serious shooting affray occurred here last evening and caused much excitement. The Rev. N. N. Beaver, a well-known evangelist who has been in the religious work for years, shot four times at Thomas G. Gray, one ball taking effect in the thigh and making a bad wound. The cause of the trouble is jealousy. Beaver believing that Gray was attempting to alienate the affections of his wife.

Suicide of a Bank Cashier.
GALENA, Ill., July 6.—Enos C. Ripley, ex-elderman and cashier of the Galena national bank, committed suicide yesterday morning by shooting himself through the head. He was suffering from an incurable ailment and would have lived but a few hours. He was 62 years old.

CUT THEIR THROATS

TWO KENTUCKY GIRLS FOULY MURDERED.

Daughters of a Wickliffe farmer assaulted and killed by an Unknown Man—The Whole Country Searching for the Criminal—Will Lynch Him.

CAIRO, Ill., July 6.—A terrible crime was committed near Wickliffe, Ky., five miles below this city, at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. John Ray is a prosperous farmer living on the Illinois Central railroad, four miles below Wickliffe. Yesterday morning his two daughters, Mary, a comely girl 17 years of age, and Annie, aged 16, went out to pick blackberries at a place about 200 yards distant from the house. They had been absent about thirty minutes when Mrs. Ray heard one of the girls scream and soon a dog which had accompanied them came running to the house uttering pitiful cries.

The frightened mother at once rushed to the place where her daughters had gone and there found the dead body of her elder daughter with her throat cut from ear to ear and her body fearfully mutilated. Nude and close beside it lay a navy blue coat over the man who had assaulted and then murdered her. The body of the younger girl could not be found.

The horrified mother rushed to the house and rang the farm bell with all her might. This aroused the neighbors and soon gathered on the scene and who a search for the missing girl was at once instituted. Her body was found about thirty feet from that of her sister. Her throat had been cut from the position in which the body lay it was evident that she had been first murdered and then tossed over the fence into the adjoining field.

The whole country was soon aroused, and armed men commenced to flock in from miles around. A party of 100 armed men left Wickliffe at 11 o'clock, and by the time they had reached the scene of the crime a similar party from Bardwell and Arling-ton arrived.

A systematic search for the murderer was commenced without delay. Three negroes who had boarded a train at the apple orchard near the home of the Rays, were arrested when they reached Fulton, forty-five miles south. A negro was arrested at Bradwell, but was released. Every suspicious character was compelled to give an account of himself, and one man came near falling a victim to the mob before he could prove an alibi.

A correspondent visited the scene of the crime and conversed with many members of the searching party, and heard the story of the two young men who had on a suspicious looking character, a light mulatto, whom they found crouching on his knees and in bows. He claimed to be from Bardwell and said he was on his way to Tongola, Ill., in search of work. This would throw him directly in the line of the place where the crime was committed. He wore a blue vest but had no coat. A man answering the same description was seen near the same place the evening before and he wore a blue coat and vest. He managed to escape from the young men, but the searchers are convinced that he is the man wanted, and attempted no concealment of the fact that he will be summarily lynched if captured. He is now surrounded in a small territory in a bend of the river.

BIG STRIKE IN COLORADO.

Quart Bearing 60 to 150 Ounces of Gold

Per Ton Found at Fulford.

FULFORD, Colo., July 6.—The mining camp here is wild over a ledge of quartz found outcropping for 3,000 feet, which gives from 60 to 150 ounces of gold per ton. Twelve assays average \$900 per ton. Mining men are flocking in from all parts of the country and the discovery has resulted in the mountains being overrun by prospectors. The discovery is considered by old mining men the biggest strike known in the state.

ONSET BURNED AT SANDY HILL, N. Y.

RUTLAND, Vt., June 8.—The stock barns on the farm known as Grassland, located in Sandy Hill, N. Y., one of the best known in eastern New York, were burned Sunday night. Sixteen horses were burned. Among the horses was the stallion Onset, for which the owner had a standing offer of \$10,000. The total loss is estimated at not less than \$75,000.

FATAL RUNAWAY IN OREGON.

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 6.—A team driven by M. P. Bradley ran away last night and upset a wagon, throwing Bradley, his wife and four children over a precipice forty feet high. Mrs. Bradley was killed and two children fatally injured. The others escaped with painful bruises.

BOOM IN GOLD MINES.

PRESCOTT, A. T., July 6.—The low

price of silver seems to have started a boom in gold properties. Several gold mines have been sold in the last month and a group of promising claims were sold yesterday to eastern men for \$100,000. Negotiations for the purchase of other claims are in progress.
