Disturbed the Leader Editor.

Just after midnight last Saturday night, as the stillness of the early Sunday morning began to lend emphasis to even the slightest sounds, and at a time when most of the population of Lodges were enjoying luxurious slumber, the quiet air was rent with cries of "Murder!" — "He's killing me." The sounds seemed to come from the vicinity of the M. E. church. They awoke the Leader representative, who lives less than a square away, and in the scant apparel usually worn during the sleeping hours of a hot summer night, he rolled out of bed and ran to where it seemed a good news item was in the making. On Franklin street near the Cottage Hotel he found two females. One of them proved to be Bertha Hall, of this place who was telling a tale of woe. She proved to be the one who had uttered the cries for help. Around the corner on Elm street sat a man, the tramp who had attacked the woman. The Leader man stood in the shadow, not so much to keep cool, as to conceal the fact that his raiment was scant. In the dooryards along either side of the street he saw ghostlike figures, and night-capped heads were seen at second story windows. The cries had attracted a few men who were still resting in front of the stores on Main street and they came running to the rescue. The Leader man then took time to put on a little more clothing, and returned to find that two women of loose morals, and their "friends" were out preening when a tramp struck one of the men, George McCoy, a blow on the head and proceeded to appropriate his female companion. McCoy ran to Main street for help, and while he was gone the woman called for aid as stated above. The tramp sitting on Elm street at first defied the crowd, but soon took to his heels and hid in Gill's heading yard. He could not be found. In fact, after hearing the details, no one cared whether the tramp was found or not. He had done nothing to merit punishment.

The women and their companions continued to keep up an annoying clatter until daylight. They spent Sunday in the woods west of town, and Sunday night went to Epperson's heading mill and tried to establish headquarters there, but at 2 a. m., Cary Snyder, the town marshal, appeared on the scene, captured the fair females, and put them in prison until morning. They were then taken before Justice Talbot, arraigned as common prostitutes, pleaded guilty, were fined \$25 each, and having but fifty cents between them, were sent to jail. They were Bertha Hall, of this place, and Lizzie Hall, one of Crawfordsville's toughest women, who it seems had helped to train Bertha in sin.

The men who ganged with the women Saturday night were numerous enough to make a small army, and we were unable to get their names without visiting the camp and remaining there, a thing we did not care to do. We have the promises of the authorities that the men shall be arrested should they again appear in town.—Lodges Leader.

Tenth Indiana Reunion.

Notice is given by Ira S. Perkins, as president and J. B. Shaw, secretary of the Tenth Indiana Infantry Association, that the fifteenth annual reunion will be held at the superior court room at the court house in Indianapolis on Wednesday and Thursday, September 6 and 7, next. The contents belonged to the tenant Moss Taylor, and were a total loss having no insurance whatever. There was a small insurance on the building.

The Coroner's Verdict.

Last Saturday Coroner Brougham filed his verdict on the killing of Wm. Hipes and daughter on the Vandia railroad on June 17. In his verdict the Coroner exonerates the railroad company and lays the blame at the door of Mr. Hipes. He says that the train gave its usual whistle for the crossing and was not running at an unusual rate of speed, hence the train men were in no way to blame for the accident.

The Covington Normal Muddle.

The affairs of this institution, after the flurry of last week, have settled down, and all connected with it are pursuing the even tenor of their ways again. The board of trustees, at a meeting held on last Friday afternoon, for the purpose of acting upon the resignation of Prof. Burton, decided to accept the same when he shall have paid or settled all indebtedness contracted by him in connection with the school, and also made provision for the payment of the expense of completing the present school year. The further action of the board was the appointing of a committee of five business men and attorneys whose duties it were to ascertain what legal action either civil or criminal could be taken against Mr. Burton in this matter. The board then promptly guaranteed the payment of teachers and expenses for the balance of the school year, and ordered that the business of the school go on. Mr. Burton failed to respond to the request of the board, and quietly left the city for Crawfordsville on Saturday night, and has not since returned. A stock company composed of prominent citizens and business men of this city is being formed which is designed to put the school upon a firmer and better basis than ever.—Covington Friend.
